OPA ON THE GRIDDLE

Administration supporters are wailing and gnashing their teeth because of House emasculation of the OPA while, on the other hand, anti-administration forces are making political hay while the sun shines.

Fate of the OPA rests in the Senate. The House version, viewed from this distance, seems to be a hodgepodge of shackling amendments based on political and personal dislikes and desires, rather than a well-conceived and organized formula to relieve our economic ills.

We suspect that the House is engaged in another of its frequent practices of delivering a sound spanking to some recalcitrant executive agency, depending upon the Senate to provide the soothing salve.

Senator Wayne Morse, speaking before the Senate April 15, told of urgings from Oregon that he cast his vote for complete abolition of the OPA.

I do not desire to cast such a vote because I firmly believe that the major objectives of OPA as intended by the OPA Act are in the best interests of this country during the reconversion period.

OPA's scare campaign is beginning to bear fruit, now that its life hangs in the balance. It has succeeded in creating widespread fear of inflation even while inflation exists.

OPA's pricing system has had one uniform result. It has consistently lowered the quality of goods we buy, despite inflated prices.

Yet, OPA seemingly operates under the theory that the vast majority of the general public is composed of fools, liars, cheats and chiselers.

We are told that disastrous inflation would follow abandonment of price controls, but we have had consumer strikes in the past, and, with existing awareness of inflationary trends, we believe unwarranted price rises would be curbed through public action.

A lot of hogwash is being dished out to the general public by propagandists on both sides of the OPA issue.

Testifying at the start of hearings on legislation to extend price controls beyond June 30, Besse observed that administration leaders wanted OPA extended without "crippling amendments" and called this "hokum of the highest order."

Senator Tobey (R-Or.) shouted for Besse to steer clear of opinion, "Are you saying that anybody who favors extension of OPA is guilty of hokum?"

Senator Capchert (R-Ind.) declared, Capchert said Economic Stabilizer Bowles and Price Administrator Porter had called businessmen "every sort of name."
