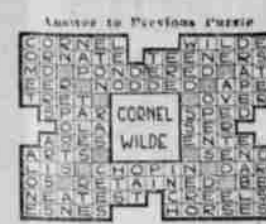

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Government Tries To Hike Production Of Cotton Apparel

WASHINGTON, April 23.—(AP)—The men's suit shortage moved up for top attention today as the government counted hopefully on new emergency measures to help ease another clothing scarcity in low-cost cotton apparel.

The Civilian Production Administration began analyzing reports from 80 manufacturers on why output of inexpensive suits fell nearly a million garments shy of the 3,500,000 goal set for the first three months of this year.

From this spot check the agency expects to learn in the next few days just what new steps may have to be taken to bring production up to schedule. The survey is being at the insistence of Maj. Gen. Graves B. Erskine, chief of the Retraining and Reemployment Administration. Recently Erskine contended that many veterans have had to turn down jobs because they could not find proper clothing.

On the cotton clothing front, the government turned last night to a combination of price increases and restoration of wartime production controls in the latest of a series of actions to obtain more yarn and fabric for shirts, underwear, pajamas, dresses and work clothing.

The aim is a 50 per cent increase in output of low-cost garments. OPA ordered reinstatement May 1 of a spindle "freeze" which applies to machines producing more than 20 per cent of the nation's cotton yarn. Under the order, which had been dropped last August, spindles diverted to output of less essential yarn must be turned back to important types produced at the end of 1943.

And to make it easier, OPA granted a 5 per cent "incentive" increase in price ceilings for cotton yarn needed for inexpensive garments.

Snap Beans One of 3 Victory Crops

Snap beans rank with carrots and tomatoes as the big three among home garden vegetables, which every garden should grow. They should never be sown until the ground warms up, because they will not germinate in cold soil.

Frost kills the young plants, and cold winds may check their growth. But sown in warm soil, they grow vigorously and quickly, the earliest bush varieties reaching table size in seven weeks. Because the seed pods are eaten, this is one of the efficient vegetables, producing heavily for the space they occupy.

There are four general types of bush beans, the green and wax (yellow) each divided into flat pod and round pod. Market beans are usually flat pod, which yield better than the round pod; and the latter have the best quality. Don't Let Seeds Form

In recent years few wax beans have been seen in markets, but in the opinion of many they are more tender than green beans. Bush beans should not be allowed to form seeds. They are at the height of flavor and tenderness from the time they have just begun to form, until they begin to make seeds; and they deteriorate somewhat after that. Both for the table and for canning they should be picked before seeds form, and not more than an hour before they are cooked.

Several Sowings Advised

If bean plants are kept picked clean, they will continue to bear all summer, producing several crops, as long as the plants are healthy. But since the first crop is always the largest, it is advisable to make several sowings in succession, so that new plants keep coming into bearing. It may be advisable to estimate your canning needs and sow a special row for putting up, so they can be harvested for that purpose. But always be ready to put up a few jars at a time, when there are more beans on the bushes than you need for the table.

In sections where leaf hoppers infest the bean plants, D. D. T. dust will be found an efficient protection against this pest, which saps the strength of the plants. The Mexican bean beetle, however, is one of the few insects which D. D. T. does not kill and where it is prevalent rotenone dust should be used.

Silage material is sometimes cut too early, but by far the most spoilage comes from cutting too late. Grass is best cut as the heads emerge or at least before bloom, while legumes make the best silage when cut in the early bloom stage.

Immature or very succulent crops need to be allowed to wilt for a few hours, particularly on sunless days. Such succulent crops can be put through a cutter set at 3-4 to 1 inch and then uniformly distributed in the silo.

Material that is too mature is also hard to seal at the top unless it is chopped fine and well tramped. If the too few feet shrink away from the wall, air penetrates and causes excessive spoilage.
