Fritz Kuhn to Be Freed by U. S. Army

FRANKFURT, April 24.—(AP)—Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German American Volksbund, will be released by the U. S. Army from a German internment camp tomorrow.

Chastened by long confinement and troubled by a heart illness, Kuhn was declared to be "not a threat" to American occupation forces in Germany.

He was expected to proceed directly to Munich, where his wife and two children live in a bomb-damaged house.

A statement today by Gen. Joseph T. McNarney's headquarters said Kuhn "is an unknown figure in Germany and his health and spirit are broken."

In jail since 1939, Kuhn served more than three and a half years in prison in the United States for embezzlement of fund funds. Immediately after completing his sentence, he was interned in Texas and a year later lost his American citizenship.

He was deported in September, 1945, to a ruined Germany, a country he had left in 1922.

Kuhn frequently has declared that the bund was a "fiasco" and that if he had it all to do over again he would let someone else campaign for Nazism.

A chemist by profession, his first worry now is to find a job.

The brigadier is a musician of note, an able speaker, and a man vitally interested in all movements for the advancement of the Kingdom of God, local Army officials said.

The Thursday evening meeting is open to the public. Visiting officers and delegates will be present from the following cities: Eugene, Coos Bay, Medford, Klamath Falls. Guest speaker for these services will be Major Clara Flack, superintendent for the Salvation Army Home and Hospital in Portland.

Couple Fined For Peace Disturbance

On two charges of "grossly disturbing the public peace," Ellen Mode, Roseburg, was fined \$50, and a 90-day jail sentence was suspended on condition that he conduct himself in a "law abiding manner in the future." Justice of the Peace Hartfield reported this morning. His wife, May Mode, was fine \$50 on the same charge.

Judge Lowe was sentenced to the county jail for 30 days for "grossly disturbing the public peace," Hartfield also reported. Lowe was fined \$15 yesterday on a charge of intoxication by City Recorder A. J. Geddes.

14 Cars Damaged in Picket Line Battle

DETROIT, April 24.—(AP)—Fourteen automobiles were damaged today when 50 carloads of supervisory and clerical employees sought to penetrate a CIO picket line at the Stinson Aircraft plant.

No reports of injuries were received during the brief, sharp fracas in which pickets hurled rocks through car windows, smashed and dented fenders, and threw acid on the vehicles.

All available members of the Wayne County Sheriff's department were hurried to the scene early today and several carloads of state police later augmented the 50 or more deputies.

Governor Kelly ordered a general alarm which sent state police into action "to preserve law and order."

Approximately 800 production workers at the Stinson plant, a division of Consolidated-Vultee Aircraft Corp., walked out April 2 in a dispute over wages and a new contract.

Circuit Judge Sherman D. Calender issued a restraining order earlier in the strike directed against union picketing activity.

Duce's Body Taken By Fascist Ghoul

ROME, April 24.—(AP)—A mysterious telephone caller told the Milan newspaper, Corriere Lombardo, today, that the body of Benito Mussolini, stolen from a grave in Potter's Field yesterday, has been spirited south across the River Po.

Minister of the Interior Romita ordered police to block all highways from Milan in an effort to frustrate any attempt to bring Mussolini's body to Rome.

Milan newspapers, meanwhile reported that police had found near the open grave a note which was signed by the "Democratic Fascist Party" and which said: "Duce, finally you are with us. We repeatedly requested of the authorities that you be given a worthy tomb, but this always was denied us. Now you will have a grave worthy of your person and of all you accomplished, covered with roses and flowers."

The newspaper Il Moretto said that for some time pamphlets had been circulating in Milan asserting that "regardless of opinions on Mussolini, he belongs to history and therefore has a right to burial. Napoleon, too, had France to disinter, but nobody questions the Invalides—his tomb."

Care Eases Shock In Transplanting

Whenever a plant is moved from one location to another it suffers a shock, and growth is checked until the plant recovers. Much study has been devoted to finding ways to lessen this shock. The points on which most authorities agree are:

When plants are moved the shorter the time between lifting and replanting the better. Roots should not be disturbed more than is necessary; even to spread them out.

Water in which plant food has been dissolved to make a weak

nutritive solution should be poured over bare roots before the plant is set and poured on the soil after planting when pot plants are used.

Leaves should not be pruned, as this increases shock; only those that die need be sacrificed.

Hints on Planting

For the amateur, who has relatively few plants to set out, care taken in this task will be repaid by speed of recovery. A hole sufficiently large to contain the roots without crowding should be dug. At the bottom, mix a tablespoon of balanced plant food with the soil, and throw in an inch of fresh soil to cover it. Then set the plant a little lower than it stood in the flat or pot, and fill in fine soil around the roots so that air pockets are excluded, and there is firm contact between the roots and soil. But merely firm, do not pound the soil, as compacting can be overcome.

By planting in cloudy weather, or in the evening, wilting may be avoided. If considerable area of leaves is removed the shock to the plant will be increased.

Don't Disturb Roots

In handling pot plants, or those started in plant bands, disturb the roots as little as possible. Do not compress the soil in which they are growing. This is usually moist and the temptation to mould it into a little mud ball is strong; but you may form a hard ball of soil from which the roots will be slow to emerge, with the result that the plant is stunted.

To prepare the nutrient starter solution, which will stimulate the plant and speed recovery from shock, stir a handful of your usual balanced plant food in a bucket of water. Pour a cupful of this over the bare roots of transplants, holding the plant over the hole in which it is to be set. In the case of pot plants, with soil undisturbed about the roots, pour on the starter solution after it has been planted.

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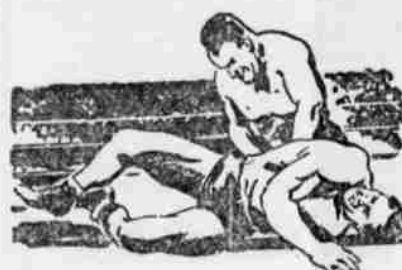

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Riotous Italian Prisoners Give Up

MILAN, April 24.—(AP)—Twenty-five hundred rioting prisoners in San Vittore prison surrendered this afternoon, after holding out for four days.

However, a small group of ringleaders, headed by Ernie Barbieri, leader of the revolt, still held out and boasted they would continue to fight to the end.

More than 30 guards held as hostages by the prisoners were freed without injury, although the death toll among the prisoners themselves rose to eight today.

The surrender came after a tower of the fortress-like prison, was half destroyed by shells and after military authorities served the rioting prisoners with an ultimatum to deliver the 73 guards or prepare for an all-out assault from tanks and artillery.

Wool Stabilizing Program Offered

President Truman has recommended a six-point wool industry stabilization program for legislative consideration. The president has suggested legislation to:

1. Raise the parity price for wool to levels "comparable" to parity prices for other farm products.
2. Permit the Commodity Credit Corporation to support wool prices through purchase or loan programs.
3. Make possible the sale of domestic wool by the CCC at prices competitive with imported wool.
4. Apply the marketing agreement act to the wool industry.
5. Use customs duties to make-up any losses in the CCC wool support program.
6. Set up a research and development program to improve wool quality and increase its use.

January-February prices to wool growers averaged about 41 cents a pound and should remain within this range through most of 1946 according to the Department of Agriculture. This is

about the same price level that prevailed in 1945. The government has announced it will continue to purchase wool through November 1, 1946, at substantially the same prices paid in 1945. Stocks of domestic wool on December 24, totaled 349 million pounds (grease basis) or about 135 million pounds more than a year earlier, according to the CCC. These stocks exceeded a year's domestic production. The department estimated that government stocks may be reduced somewhat before the 1946 clip becomes available this spring, since CCC selling prices have been reduced.

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
