Part of Scottish Castle Gift To General Eisenhower in Gratitude for War Services

EDINBURGH—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has all the makings of a "Scottish Nobleman" to add the many laurels conferred upon him, since he accepted the gift of part of Culzean Castle and its noble facilities.

The general's suite on the top floor of the castle commands a magnificent view of the Firth of Clyde, halfway between Edinburgh and Glasgow, and along with it goes the use of a family pew in an old "kirk."

The presentation was made by the family of the Lords Alisa, which has an American connection through the marriage, in 1769, of the great-grandfather of the present lord to the daughter of John Watts of New York. Members of the family will continue to use one wing of the castle, and other portions will be opened to the public.

Includes Hunting Rights—The presentation was arranged through the National Trust, a non-taxable, non-profit organization formed during the war to help preserve for Britain her ancient estates whose traditional owners no longer are able to bear the cost of upkeep. Through this arrangement, many families have donated their holdings for school, park, rest home and other uses while retaining certain living rights for themselves.

The presentation to General Eisenhower also carries with it the rights to some 2,000 acres of shooting ground, made-to-order

Anglers Make Good Catches on Opening Day of Season

REEDSPORT—Pierce Duckett, operator of the Loon Lake resort, reports that opening of the fishing season brought the largest influx of people to the Loon Lake country since the resort has been in operation. The Duckett cabins were filled to capacity and additional accommodations were provided in private homes. Some anglers brought their own camping equipment and enjoyed the outdoors.

Both on Saturday and Sunday, 75 fishing boats were counted on the lake each day. Occupants of these boats averaged three to the boat, or 225 persons, who turned in a count of 2,500 trout. Besides these, a number of boats were launched in remote places and were not seen by the counters, and no report of their catch was made. A number of shore fishermen remained uncounted as well as those on snail streams feeding the lake.

Dick Miles of the state police reported not less than 300 people fishing in the Smith River trout grounds, with everyone successful in catching the limit. He also reported that roads on the Smith were bad, and anglers faced difficulty in reaching the headwaters of small streams off the Smith, as well as headwaters of the Smith itself.

River Also Yields Well
Reports from other lake fishing resorts, as well as from smaller streams opening into the lakes, and in the Umpqua, where trout anglers were well rewarded with excellent catches, and that no one returned empty-handed.

It is apparent to sportsmen here that the problem of the Fish and Game Commission is to supply the lower Umpqua Valley fishing grounds with sufficient stock. With the catch of 2,500 cutthroat trout from Loon Lake equalling in two days the number of seven-inch trout recently dumped there to boost the fish population, how can the piscatorial desires of the lake stay long enough to become acquainted with the water and the hiding places from anglers?

Romita declined to identify the persons arrested, saying he did not want to "interfere" with the investigation.

Alta Fescue With Subclover Found Best Pasture Mix

Western Oregon farmers faced with the problem of what to sow on the so-called "red hill" soils where a permanent pasture is desired can best plant alta fescue in mixture with Tallarook subterranean clover, according to a newly published Circular of Information No. 376 entitled "Results of Permanent Pasture Grasses and Legume Experiment, Red Soils Experimental Area at Oregon City" by Edwin Keltner, superintendent.

As a project of the Oregon State College experiment station, six pasture grasses in general use in western Oregon were seeded alone and in mixture with subterranean clover and white clover in the fall of 1940. The grasses were: English ryegrass, chewing fescue, alta fescue, red creeping fescue, orchard grass and highland bent grass. Seeding rates and fertilizer applications are included in the circular.

Mixed Grass Preferred
All of the plots received pasturing throughout the summer months by a herd of dairy heifers. From the palatability standpoint, English ryegrass was the number one choice followed by little preference between alta fescue and orchard grass. The English ryegrass provided only a short season, however, and was gone soon after the rains ceased. The cattle showed a distinct liking for the mixed grass and clover seedings over grass planted alone.

The subterranean clover increased rather than decreased its stand in spite of constant pasturing.

The circular is available from any western Oregon county extension office.

Approval Granted New Commercial Construction

PORTLAND, April 25—(AP)—The Civilian Production Administration yesterday approved applications for some \$420,207 of new commercial construction in Oregon.

Among the approved buildings are a \$254,000 cold storage warehouse at Odell for the Apple Growers Association; a \$45,000 farm equipment building at Hermiston for the Farm Bureau Co-op; and a \$30,000 myrtlewood manufacturing project for V. Morgenson, Grants Pass.
