M., Wednesday, May 15, 1946, for removing the wooden stringers and deck from the existing bridge over the South Umpqua River on Oak Street in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the replacement with a steel open grid deck and steel stringers to support the same. Requires approximately 14,000 square feet of grid decking.
