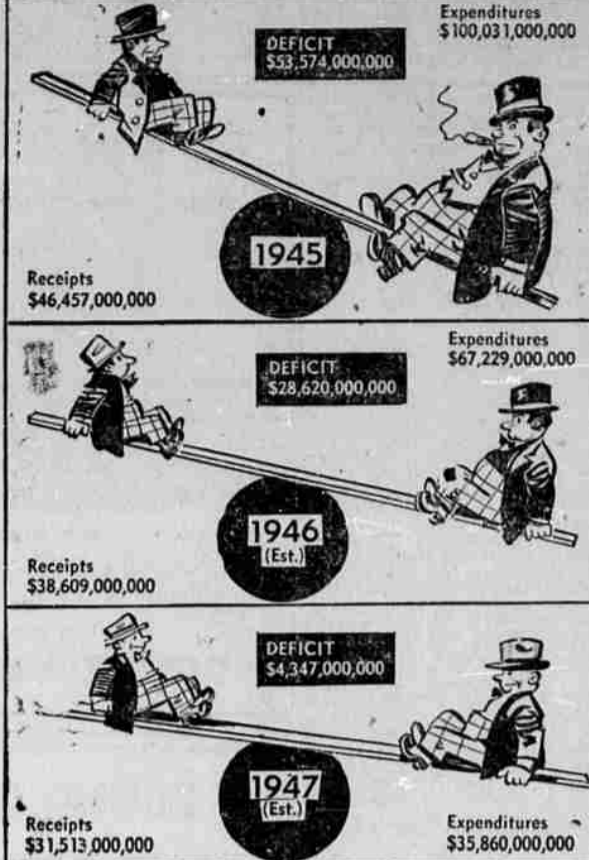

What the War Cost 'Big Three'

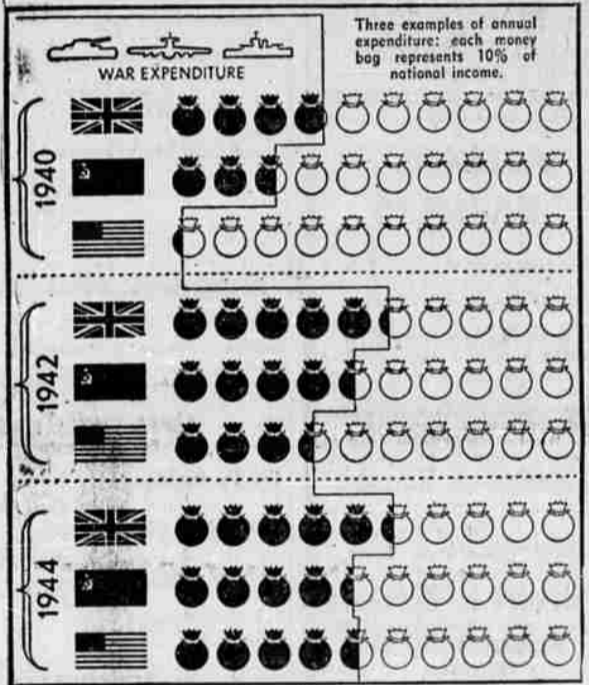

Prices Boosted on GMC-Made Autos

WASHINGTON, May 1. — (AP) — OPA yesterday raised retail price ceilings for General Motors automobiles by \$16 to \$60 to compensate for wage increases in the industry.

The price hikes, effective immediately, range from \$16 to \$30 on Pontiac and Oldsmobile models; from \$18 to \$38 on Buicks; and from \$24 to \$60 on Cadillacs.

The increase is \$18 for the only Chevrolet model which has been priced earlier on the basis of manufacturing cost prior to the wage increase of 18 cents hourly recently granted by GM. The one model given a ceiling previously was the Chevrolet stivemaster four-door sedan.

On other Chevrolet models being priced for the first time, retail ceilings range from \$51 to \$68 above 1942 prices.

The agency added that the new General Motors price schedule provides for absorption by dealers "of much of the factor — 'rice increase' being granted to manufacturers. As in the case of other car dealers, GM dealers' prewar discount margins are being trimmed an additional two percentage points.

Magic Show Dated Here May 7 and 8

One of the West's greatest magical shows, Warren Gram's House of Magic, will be presented in Roseburg next Tuesday and Wednesday, May 7 and 8, under sponsorship of the Umpqua Post, No. 16, American Legion. A matinee will be presented Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and evening performances at 8 o'clock in Roseburg Senior High School auditorium.

The show will be a full stage production of magic, featuring not only Gram, but his wife, Lucille, and Ronaldo, who furnishes magic comedy relief. Gram is a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians.

As one of five similar two-hour stage productions in the country today, the House of Magic includes everything from modern legerdemain to authentic Oriental magic comprised of secrets jealously guarded for centuries.

The thrilling trunk escape act featured in Gram's show is the identical escape staged by the late Harry Houdini for 15 years. Houdini is still remembered for this act, although he died in 1926.

Competing as the top spot in the show is the act in which Lucille is sawed in half, as well as the sword box in which Lucille is locked, with dozens of swords being thrust through.
