2 Killed, 7 Injured In Collision of Autos

biles, it was a miracle anyone
escaped alive.
All available ambulances were
used to rush the injured to Mercy
Hospital.

Rumors, which circulated freely
Sunday that others of the ac-
cident victims had died, were un-
founded.

Lacking definite information,
police were working on the the-
ory that the five Myrtle Creek
residents were returning home
from Roseburg, and that the
three Camas Valley youths and
the one Roseburg girl were en-
route to Roseburg following a
dance.

One of Injured Near Death
Ambulances of the Roseburg
Funeral Home were called to the
scene of the accident by state po-
lice. L. L. Powers, funeral direc-
tor who answered the call, said
the two cars involved were a
southbound coupe and a north-
bound two-door sedan which met
in the southbound traffic lane.

Miss Hubbard and Milton ap-
parently had been killed instan-
taneously, Powers said. They were
taken from the front seat of the sedan.
Passengers in the car were Hum-
phreys and Miss Bollman.

Of the seven taken to the hos-
pital, four are seriously injured
with one not expected to survive,
Dr. J. M. Boyles stated at the hos-
pital this morning. Three others
were less seriously injured. Four
of the victims suffered both legs
broken, one with fractures above
and below the knees. The patients
were not identified.

Milton Born In California
Donald Taylor Milton, one of
the two Camas Valley youths killed
in the accident, was born in
Oakland, Calif., Jan. 30, 1929. He
had been a resident of Camas Val-
ley for the past three years.

Surviving are his parents, Mr.

and Mrs. Frank Howard Milton,
Camas Valley; a brother, Frank
Howard Milton, Jr., with the U. S.
Navy, stationed at Green Cove,
Florida; two sisters, Joannine and
Judith Ann Milton, Camas Val-
ley; a grandfather, David Taylor
Camas Valley, and paternal
grandparents, Mr. and Mrs.
Frank Milton, Belle River, Ill.

The body is at the Douglas Fun-
eral Home.

Ex-RHS Student Victim
Jeanne Marvyn Hubbard, 16,
also killed in the collision, was
born September 28, 1929, in Rose-
burg. She was a student in the
Roseburg High School and was a
member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving are her mother, Mrs.
Marie Hubbard; her father, Alvin
Hubbard; her step-father, Rich-
ard Firmas, all of Roseburg, and
several aunts and uncles.

Funeral services will be held in
the chapel of the Roseburg Fun-
eral Home Thursday, May 9, at
2 P. M. with the Rev. DeLoss
Crook officiating. Interment will
be in the Masonic cemetery.

monial functions and to the pro-
vision of small ineffective com-
bat formations and labor troops
for service on the landing
beaches.

"Passage of the unification leg-
islation as now framed will in all
probability spell extinction of the
Marine Corps."

Indispensability Claimed
Whereas he said the Marines as
early as 1921 "accurately forecast
the exact pattern of the coming
war against Japan," and develop-
ed the technique of amphibious
warfare, Vandenberg declared
that without vigorous Marine
Corps there is "every indication
that our future capacity to con-
duct amphibious warfare would be
seriously impaired."

The Naval committee is in its
second week of hearings on the
merger bill written by the Senate
military committee. It calls for a
single department of common de-
fense to replace the present war
and Navy departments. Those
services, along with the air
forces, would be represented by
undersecretaries, without cabinet
rank.

While the measure probably
will be cleared to the Senate
floor shortly after the Naval
committee concludes its hearings,
the Senate timetable makes it
increasingly doubtful that the bill
will come to a vote this year.

**Oregon Certified Pilots
Tripled Since 1944**

PORTLAND, May 6.—(AP)—The
total of certified pilots and air-
planes has more than tripled in
Oregon since 1944, the Civil
Aeronautics Administration re-
ported today.

P. S. Skidmore, CAA inspector,
said the number of planes in-
creased from 122 in July, 1944 to
575 now, with present figures in-
complete and growing rapidly.

the rifle he had seized from the
guard.

Also dead in the narrow, pipe-
filled passageway were:
Joseph Paul Cretzer, 35, Los
Angeles bank robber who had
assumed command and carried on
the fight furiously, despite his
quick conclusion that the break
had failed and "we're as far from
San Francisco as ever."

Marvin F. Hubbard, 36, Ten-
nessee kidnaper, who had lived
until Saturday morning—outlast-
ing Coy and Cretzer by one night.
The rifle and pistol which Coy
had wrested from Burch were
found beside the convicts.

There was no further resist-
ance; the battle of the rock was
ended.

Guard Discards Key
Dead were two guards—one,
Harold P. Sites, shot in a val-
iant early assault attempting to
free hostages; the other, W. H.
Miller, captured unarmed and
killed when the blood-maddened
felons turned their guns on their
seven hostages. Miller had a key
to the back door of the wing—
but he threw it into an empty
cell and died without revealing it.

Fourteen guards were wounded
during the siege; so was one con-
vict, James Groves, described as
a "bystander."

sion of oil drums in the service
station showered sparks onto
neighboring homes and ignited
the brush fires that soon swept

Six cabins owned by Indians

White Salmon River were lev-
eled.

There was no official estimate
of damage, but Hood River fire-
men said totally damaged prop-
erty and belongings were val-
ued at about \$85,000. A dozen
homes were partially damaged.

jobs in loop skyscrapers.
In Pittsburgh, Carnegie-Illinois
Steel Corp., U. S. Steel's biggest
subsidiary, slated operations this
week at nine per cent of capac-
ity, lower than at any point dur-
ing the bottom depression year of
1932.

Congress Demands Action
Meanwhile, Congressional tem-
pers mounted. A House judiciary
subcommittee scheduled hearings
on a bill to outlaw any form of
special production payments to
unions. Such a bill, if passed,
would eliminate John L. Lewis'
chief demand, which would pro-
vide a health and welfare fund
for his miners through royalties
paid on each ton of coal mined.

Earlier, several Senators pub-
licly demanded government ac-
tion to reopen the mines.

Persons who attended the last
four days of contract negotiations
between the coal operators and
Lewis' AFL United Mine Work-
ers said the miners' chief has not
said a word in the meetings, leav-
ing all discussion to his subordi-
nates.

Transit Strikes Also Faced
Meanwhile, three communities
in different sections of the coun-
try had transportation troubles.

In Los Angeles, nearly a mil-
lion street cars and bus riders
relied on taxicabs, friends, or stout
walking shoes for transportation
as a strike by 4,000 AFL Trans-
portation Union members con-
tinued for the fourth day. The
union seeks \$1.36 an hour and a

40-hour week, compared to \$1.03
an hour and a 44-hour week be-
fore the strike.

In Atlanta, 1,350 street car and
bus operators who struck six
days ago, were to vote today on
a new agreement reached by
union representatives and the
Georgia Power Co. The operators,
members of the AFL Amalgam-
ated Association of Street Car,
Electric Railway and Motor
Coach Employees, had rejected a
previous agreement because, they
said, it failed to include a broad-
ened pension plan. The union al-
so had demanded an hourly wage
boost from 86 cents to \$1.12. De-
tails of the new agreement were
not announced.

And in western Pennsylvania,
West Virginia and Ohio, Blue
Ridge Bus Lines service was tied
up for the second day by a walk-
out of AFL-Motor Coach Unions
workers.

On Other Fronts
The union is seeking an hourly
wage increase of 30 cents, and
struck after rejecting a company
offer which George L. Bennett,
union president, said equalled
about 12 cents.

In Passaic county, N. J., four
AFL construction locals ended a
walkout which began last Wed-
nesday and agreed to accept "tem-
porarily" a five-cent hourly in-
crease for hod carriers and a 12-
cent boost for bricklayers. The
hod carriers had asked a 15 cent
increase, the bricklayers 30 cents.
