Butter Problem Policy Finds Top Officials Divided

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—A three-week-old clash of top level views on how to put more butter on the nation's dinner table appeared headed today for an early showdown.

Involved in the controversy which flared into the open on Capitol Hill yesterday are Stabilization Director Bowles and OPA Chief Porter, on the one hand, and Secretary of Agriculture on the other.

At issue is a program Bowles announced three weeks ago in an effort to keep milk output high and to divert more cream and butterfat into butter manufacture. Specifically it called for:

1. Larger subsidy payments to dairy farmers during the flush milk production months of May to June to offset increases in production costs.
2. Government orders limiting the use of butterfat in ice cream making and banning the sale of whipping cream.

Bowles put the higher subsidies into effect but Anderson, who was to have issued the ice cream and whipping cream orders, withheld action on them.

Price Increases Favored

The cabinet officer has contended it would be difficult to enforce the orders, particularly among the thousands of smaller distributors of milk and cream. He also argued that the only effective way to get more butter is to increase the price sufficiently to enable butter makers to compete with shipping cream and ice cream sales.

Anderson has suggested a six-cent a pound increase in the retail price of butter.

Farm Toil Eased By Development Of Chemical Aids

CHICAGO—Some of science's new developments in short-cut driveway and make farm life easier are being exhibited in Chicago by the United States Rubber Co. Among new agricultural chemicals and rubber products on display are:

A new chemical spray that smother the weed crop and destroy it. The chemical can be used on lawns and in fields to eliminate such broad-leaved plants as bindweed, Canadian thistle or dandelion.

A new seed treatment designed to protect planted seeds against decay and harmful soil fungi until fields weather can get to work and start growth.

A rubberized electric heating pad that is installed in the top of a chick brooder cover.

A latex version of the pad is available for hotbeds, placed beneath the soil where it creates heat to germinate seed.

For the farmer's wife, and other wives, too:

A new textile permanent starch treatment that is invisible on fabric and unaffected by laundering and dry cleaning.

A tea towel for drying dishes that is made with 20 per cent asbestos fiber. The fabric is said to have great absorbency, quick polishing minus lint, and resistance to fire.

Pre-War Boundaries of Romania Are Restored

PARIS, May 7.—(AP)—The foreign ministers council agreed today to grant Romania her 1938 boundaries with Hungary and Bulgaria, but recessed in complete disagreement on questions of Danube navigation and freedom of access to the Black Sea coast.

The boundary decision gave Transylvania, disputed by Hungary, to Romania and restored the Hitler and Mussolini-dictated settlement at Vienna during the war. The decision also restored Dobruja, disputed by Bulgaria, to Romania.

But the disposition of Bessarabia, which was annexed by Russia at the time of the Romanian surrender in 1944 and which, in fact, had been occupied by the Russians in an independent settlement in 1940 before Romania entered the war, was not mentioned by the ministers. Presumably its status remains unchanged, therefore.

Primary Elections On In 4 States; Vote Light

(By the Associated Press.)

Primaries in four states rang up the off-year election curtain today, and in two of them the CIO political action committee sought to demonstrate its continued effectiveness at the polls.

Top interest centered in the four-cornered race for the Democratic senatorial nomination in Ohio and the two-man contest for a district Alabama house seat—both featured by PAC activity.

Indiana and Florida also held primaries. In all, the four states will select candidates for two Senate and 49 House seats in Congress. Two gubernatorial nominations also are at stake.

Advance indications pointed to a generally light vote.

Neuner's Opinion Asked On Office Space Leasing

SALEM, Ore., May 7.—(AP)—The State Board of Control decided today to ask Attorney General Neuner for an opinion on whether leases of office space in Portland by state departments dependent upon legislative appropriation are legal.

The board itself raised the question, thinking the leases might be made void by the constitution, which provides that the state legislature may not create a debt of more than \$50,000.

The question came up when the State Department, ordered out of the Oregon building, prepared to sign a new lease for space on the Portland east side.

The state has made such leases for many years without the question of constitutionality ever being raised.

McKenzie River Yields 'Biggest' Rainbow Trout

PORTLAND, May 7.—(AP)—Catch of a Rainbow trout 31 1/2 inches long and weighing 13 1/2 pounds in the McKenzie River was reported today by A. J. Shoyfill, Portland, and fishermen who accompanied him.

Veteran McKenzie River guides told him, he said, that it probably was the largest ever caught in that stream.

He hooked the trout at the head of Bear Creek rapids.

Anniversary of German Surrender Quietly Noted

REIMS, May 7.—(AP)—The city of Reims, where one year ago today Col. Gen. Gustav Jodl scratched his name on a document which sent the European phase of World War II into the archives of history, observed the first anniversary of the surrender quietly—with too few soldiers in town to hold a parade.

The citizens and soldiers observed the day mainly by visiting the surrender room in the "little red schoolhouse," the former "war room" of supreme headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Forces, which has become a

Strike Staged by Glendale Pupils

Pupils at Glendale High School were reported to have gone on strike yesterday morning over failure of the Glendale school board to renew the contract of David Clark, principal, said Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, today.

The students were said to have walked out after a student-organized petition brought no action from the school board on the question of renewing the principal's contract.

Mrs. Gorrell did not know how many pupils were participating in the strike. She said she was told only four students had refused to sign the petition.

Clark serves as athletic coach and instructor in commercial subjects as well as school principal, Mrs. Gorrell said. According to report, the school board had refused to sign a contract, after the principal had "stalled" on a contract offer for next year, earlier in the spring.

A school board member told Mrs. Gorrell that any action taken by the students would not influence the board. The petition asking that Clark's contract be renewed has been circulating for more than a week.
