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Pulitzer Prizes
Awarded for Top
Newspaper Work

NEW YORK, May 7.—(AP)—The New York Times won a special \$500 gold medal Pulitzer prize today for meritorious public service as a result of its 15-year investigation of judicial practices in the United States district court for the middle district of Pennsylvania.

Arnold Cortes of the New

York Times won the \$500 prize for distinguished correspondence for his reports from Buenos Aires, Argentina.

Edward A. Harris of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch won the award for domestic telegraphic reporting for his articles on the Tidewater oil situation which contributed to the opposition to Edwin W. Pauley's proposed appointment as undersecretary of the Navy.

For distinguished international telegraphic reporting, Homer Bigart of the New York Herald-Tribune was honored for "distinguished reporting during the year 1945 from the Pacific war theater."

A-Bomb Story Tops

William L. Laurence of the New York Times won the prize for distinguished reporting with his eyewitness account of the atom bombing of Nagasaki and his subsequent articles on the development, production and significance of the atomic bomb.

The play "State of the Union" by Russell Crouse and Howard Lindsay won the prize for drama. For the fourth time since the awards were instituted in 1917 no novel of "sufficient excellence" was published during the year and no prize was awarded.

Linnie Marsh Wolfe's "Son of the Wilderness" won the prize for a distinguished American biography.

"The Age of Jackson" by Arthur M. Schlesinger, Jr., was declared the distinguished book of the year upon the history of the United States.

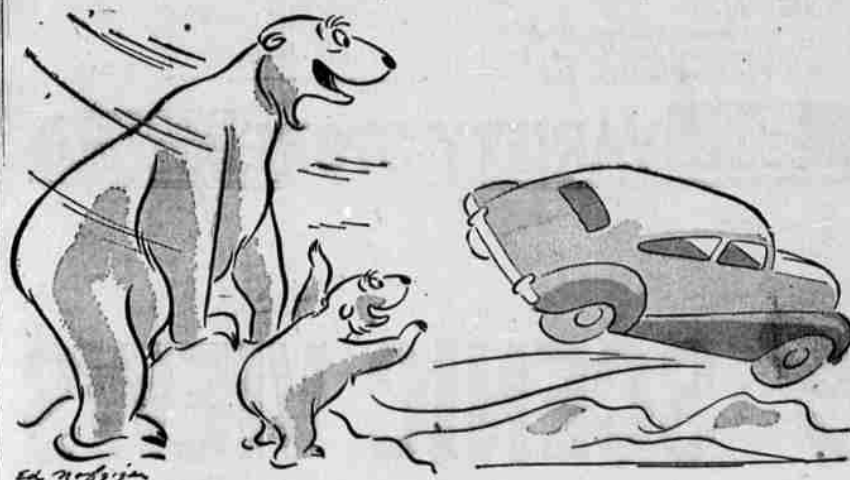

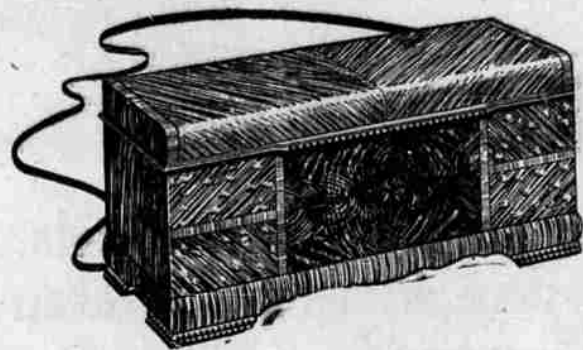

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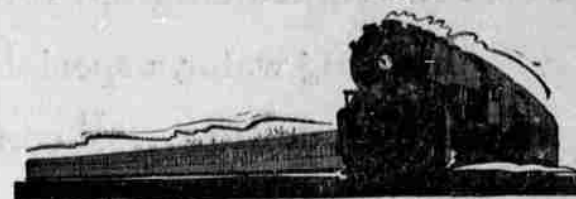
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
