4-Power Parley Nearing Collapse

PARIS, May 8.—(AP)—The foreign ministers conference appeared today to be breaking up on the rocks of Soviet-Western discord. American sources said U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes, with a dramatic reference to this first anniversary of official V-E day, proposed shifting the burden of drafting Europe's peace treaties from the shoulders of the four foreign ministers of Russia, Britain, France and the United States to a 21-nation peace conference to meet in Paris June 15.

Byrnes was quoted as saying on behalf of his proposal that "sometimes when we are confronted with problems like those confronting us" it was best to let "fresh minds" tackle the questions.

NEW YORK, May 8.—(AP)—Andrei A. Gromvko, Soviet delegate, boycotted the 40th session of the United Nations Security Council, which was called today to receive reports on the evacuation of Iran by Red Army troops.

U. S. Invites 11 Nations To Atomic Bomb Tests

WASHINGTON, May 8.—(AP)—The United States put an end today to a lot of speculation about "operation crossroads" by inviting 11 nations to send official representatives and news correspondents to the coming atomic bomb tests in the Pacific.

Uncertainty on the question ended when Acting Secretary of State Acheson announced last night that President Truman had authorized invitations for all countries having membership on the United Nations atomic energy commission.

In addition to the United States, these countries are Russia, Britain, France, China, Canada, Australia, Brazil, Egypt, Poland, The Netherlands and Mexico.

NSC Instructor Protests Removal

PORTLAND, May 8.—(AP)—The State Board of Higher Education has under advisement a protest of Earl G. Mason, professor of forestry at Oregon State College, against his removal from the staff at the end of this year.

Mason had refused to resign. His release from the staff was included in personnel changes passed yesterday making a reversal and reinstatement necessary if the board were to re-employ him.

taken following a hearing where Mason, President A. L. Strand and Paul M. Dunn, dean of forestry, submitted statements.

Strand, declaring that Mason refused to cooperate with the new administration despite attempts of Strand and Dunn to help him, said Mason had destroyed his usefulness by "continually shadow boxing in a ring long since empty."

Mason charged that he had not been given assignments suited to his abilities or interests, and asserted that the forestry school was being misadministered. "We have a second rate school of forestry and always have had," he declared.
