

Dusette, Angelo Top Next Bout at Roseburg Armory

Bruno Angelo, the burly Italian who pulled his way to the Pacific Coast junior heavyweight wrestling title, refused to sign for a title match here next Saturday against Georges Dusette—unless Promoter Don Owen would guarantee him \$500. Owen turned down the offer, explaining that the top title purse is usually half that total.

The two grapplers—the villainous Italian and the scientific Frenchman—will meet, however, in Saturday's headliner at the Roseburg Armory, but the engagement will be a non-title affair. Although Dusette was anxious to meet Angelo for the title, he was content with the assignment, believing that he could force the champ into a title defense by handing him a decisive defeat.

Anthony Martinielli and Jack Kiser have been signed to meet in the preliminary engagement here Saturday—a match that should rival any this season in good fundamental wrestling.

Angelo has been battering his way through all kinds of competition for the past several months

and has become the scourge of northwest grappling circles. The Italian meanie has become "enemy No. 1" in nearly every mat city in the state. He has been the target of several attacks from rabid Douglas County mat followers and on one occasion suffered a deep gash on his head when kicked by a local fan.

Dusette, already one of the most popular matmen to show here, could establish himself as a local hero with Douglas County mat followers if he should hand Angelo a physical whipping here Saturday night.

Oaks Climb Closer to 2nd Place Los Angeles

Grand Slam Homer Wins for Boston In 14th Inning

(Associated Press Sports Writer) Leon Culberson is Boston's fair haired boy today because of his 14th inning home run with the bases loaded yesterday that stretched the Red Sox win streak to 12 straight.

Boston goes after a new team win record today in a game with Chicago. No Red Sox team ever has won more than 12 in succession.

The triumph boosted the Red Sox first place margin to 3½ games over the idle New York Yankees whose series finale with the White Sox was postponed because of threatening weather.

While the Sox were cementing their advantage, the St. Louis Cardinals were taking undisputed possession of first place in the National, trimming the Boston Braves, 6-4, Brooklyn, which started the day tied with the Red Birds, was kept idle by cold weather in Pittsburgh.

Catcher Mueller's consecutive game streak was snapped at 233 games when Manager McKechnie benched him, in Cincinnati's 2-1 edge over New York. Frey's inside-the-park homer proved to be the winning margin in Beggs' third triumph. The Chicago-Philadelphia tilt was rained out.

In addition to Boston's win streak in the American, Detroit provided some excitement by downing Philadelphia, 7-2, on Trout's nine-hit effort. Greenberg's fourth homer helped the cause.

Washington eked out a 2-1 verdict over Cleveland in 10 innings.

Salary Hikes at Oregon Higher Schools Slated

PORTLAND, May 8—(AP)—A system-wide pay increase in all institutions was approved by the

State Board of Higher Education here today as it adopted annual budgets for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The salary increases were for a minimum of \$150 per year and averaged approximately \$370 per year for 802 staff members in the system, Edgar W. Smith, chairman of the finance committee, reported. The adjustments, urged by faculty committees at the March board meeting, were passed essentially as worked out by the chancellor and institution executives. They apply to all except those engaged recently at advanced levels.

The budget also provides \$160,000 to put the state retirement plan into effect, \$17,000 for civil service assessment, \$7,500 for administrative costs of retirement and civil service, and various other special reserves, leaving an unappropriated balance of \$115,414.68.

Jail Occupants Increase

Fifty-four persons were registered in the county jail during the month of April, Deputy Sheriff Dick Baker reports. This is an increase of four persons over the figure for March.

"If this keeps up, there may be a housing shortage in the county jail," Baker said. He added a word of caution, however, to would-be law breakers. "Don't worry, there are a few rooms left!"

Contempt Enough

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 8.—(AP)—Attorney Booth McAbee began arguing with the judge. "Ten dollars for contempt of court," said Justice of the Peace Paul Elwell.

"Ten dollars would not begin to express my contempt of this court," snapped McAbee. "Fifty dollars," said the justice. The attorney was silent.

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
