

Navy Stores Taken From Dump Have Little Value

ASTORIA, Ore., May 8. (AP)—Value of Navy stores recovered from the Astoria city dump in April was \$210, two rear admirals, investigating Rep. Norblad's (R-Ore.) charges of waste, said today.

The \$210 was only two tenths

of one per cent of the \$104,562 of commodities shipped to Seattle from 65 ships unloaded here that month for decommissioning, the officers said.

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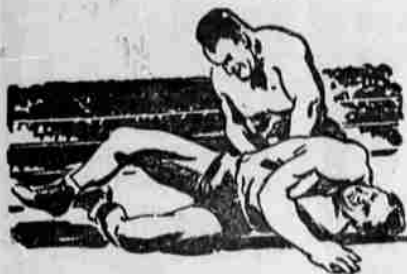
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Advertisers Contribute To Relief of Famine

Contribution of \$1,000 by the Roseburg Seventh Day Adventist Church toward the \$200,000 being collected throughout North America for famine relief in Europe and Asia, was announced today.

The church has sent several men to Europe to direct the distribution of food in famine stricken areas. The church's director of European relief has set up headquarters in Copenhagen, Denmark, to purchase supplies in Scandinavian countries. Other relief workers are assisting in Switzerland. The central relief committee, just set up by the church's headquarters in Washington, D. C., has appointed purchasing agents in the United States to buy and ship food overseas.

The denomination's clothing relief program has already resulted in the shipment of more than 400 tons of used clothing overseas and the purchase of new blankets, clothing and shoes from the United States government, also to be sent overseas.

Peace Basis Knotty Task

Estimates of the condition in which the world finds itself on today's V-E anniversary leave little doubt that the allied powers have made considerable progress toward organizing machinery to preserve peace once they establish it. But it is the process of establishing the peace that presents the toughest going.

Almost the only major problem in Europe on which the United States, Britain, Russia and France seem able to find a common denominator of agreement at the moment is the one presented by the Franco government in Spain. They don't like Franco.

But in the major political disputes concerning Russia's rights in the Balkans, the future of Germany, British domination in the Mediterranean—on these there is no basic agreement. And officials here hold little hope of early settlements.

Rehearing on Portland School Tax Issue Asked

SALEM, Ore., May 8. (AP)—The Portland school district directors asked the State Supreme Court today for a rehearing of the case in which the court ruled 4 to 2 that Multnomah County Election Registrar James W. Gleason has no power to call a special school election to levy \$1,750,000 in new taxes.

The district had brought the suit, and after the court's ruling, Governor Snell refused to call a special session to amend the election registrar law so that the election could be held. The election was scheduled for May 17.

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get 400,000 of the idle coal miners back to work as the AFL-United Mine Workers policy committee announced it stood back of John L. Lewis' demands for a health and welfare fund and other concessions.

From coal operators came word that "no progress" had been made during the morning session toward ending the 38-day-old strike. John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers were standing pat on their original contract demands and the government was preparing new measures to deal with the coal shortage.

The Indiana Municipal League, representing 535 Hoosier towns and cities, sent messages to President Truman and UMW head John L. Lewis declaring the operation of every waterworks in the state is dependent on electricity or coal and the coal reserves are nearly depleted.

The league asked that steps be taken to "make some arrangement whereby our municipalities can pump water for fire protection and public health."

"Brownout" in Big Cities

Detroit, Chicago and Washington were major cities observing "brownout" restrictions while other urban centers considered similar measures to conserve fading coal supplies. The industrial management council and retail merchant's council at Rochester, N. Y., yesterday adopted a resolution calling for a "brownout" May 17. A revised coal supply estimate gave Philadelphia four-week reprieve from an expected "drought."

The New York City police commissioner, Arthur W. Wallender, yesterday ordered an immediate survey of all reserve soft coal supplies in industrial plants, office buildings and other commercial structures, presumably to determine how much fuel would be available for public utilities in case of emergency.

Violence entered the mine strikes yesterday when one UMW picket was killed and six others injured at Harlan, Ky., in an outburst of gunfire involving Progressive Miners employed in the Benham coal mine of the International Harvester Co.

ment of this type. "It is difficult to determine what loose rock will do when dumped into the river bed and how it will stand in place when the river is in flood stage," he said.

Metal cribs bolted together to remain in place, would prevent a greater portion of the rock from washing away when it "sluffed" and rolled down the embankment. The city engineer estimated the rock for such a fill would cost \$2 a cubic yard if hauled from the rock quarry above Kelley's Korner on the Pacific Highway. The fill would have a 300-foot length.

Flood Damage Cited

Floods last winter and in previous years have washed away 20 feet of the embankment above Deer Creek. A house located south of the creek is now balanced precariously on the river bank and is in danger of being carried away in the next flood.

Flood waters last winter came within four feet of the top of the 26-foot dike, Miller said. Much of the top soil of the dike, in which he has attempted to grow willow trees for reinforcement, was washed out, he said. There is danger that even more of the dike will wash away next winter.

he twice had pushed through the Senate legislation to set up minimum driving standards for motorists crossing state lines, only to see it killed in the House.

He said some states "are taking no steps to keep you and me from being killed by some moron that has no more right to be at the wheel of a car than he has to be at the throttle of an engine."

He added: "It is perfectly absurd" for states to permit a person to purchase a car and drive it "whether he is insane, a nut, or a moron." Asserting that "people are literally murdered every day," he declared the challenge of mounting highway deaths "must and will be met."

might have added that the neighboring fiery Arabian states are showing signs of making Egypt's troubles their own.

The British military occupation of Egypt began 64 years ago, but we needn't go back further than the beginning of the first World War when Egypt in theory was still a province of Turkey. As soon as the Turks entered the war on the German side, England deposed the Egyptian Khedive and established a protectorate under Sultan Hussein Kamil. That protectorate lasted until 1922, and it not only bred strong anti-British feeling but stimulated nationalism.

three opponents and won the Democratic nomination, assuring him of election in the fall. He will succeed Senator Charles O. Andrews, retiring because of ill health.

Holland had two-to-one lead over former Representative Lex Green, who ran second.

One of the two gubernatorial primaries, James E. (Big Jim)

Folsom, war veteran supported by the CIO-PAC, led Alabama's Lieut. Gov. Handy Ellis, but neither was close to a majority in the five-man field. They will engage in a run-off June 4.

Gov. Lausche Easy Winner

Ohio's Democratic Governor, Frank J. Lausche, piled up a landslide renomination victory over Joseph Torok, Jr., politically unknown grocery worker of Youngstown. Former Attorney General Thomas J. Herbert won the Republican nomination easily from Albert E. Payne, Springfield manufacturer.

Rep. Luther Patrick of the Birmingham, Ala., district, endorsed by the CIO-PAC, trailed Laurie

Battle, war veteran and political newcomer. Rep. Albert Rains of the fifth Alabama district, also supported by the union group, lost to former Rep. Joe Starnes. Alabama's seven other representatives were renominated.

Rep. Cannon Badly Beaten

Rep. Pat Cannon of Miami was snowed under by George A. Smathers, 32-year-old ex-Marine, as Florida nominated four other congressional incumbents.

Six Republican congressmen from Indiana who had opposition were renominated, including Rep. Charles Halleck, chairman of the house Republican campaign committee.

In Ohio incumbent George Ben-

der of Cleveland defeated Norman A. Imrie, former newsmen of Columbus, for the Republican nomination for congressman at large.

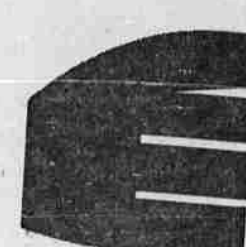
The other 22 Ohio congressmen, 17 Republicans and five Democrats, either had been renominated or were running ahead.

Negroes voted on a statewide basis for the first time in hitherto "white primaries" of Alabama and Florida, but there were no reports of instances where their numbers were decisive.

In Florida, 32,000 Negroes voted. There was no estimate of the number in Alabama.

Voting was light in all except the Alabama primaries where former servicemen exempt from the poll tax swelled the balloting.

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
