

Camp Fire Girls' Annual Camp Fixed For Changed Dates

The annual Camp Fire Girls Camp will be held from June 26 to July 10, instead of August 7-21, at Camp Kilowan, camp of the Willamette area of Camp Fire Girls, according to an announcement made today by the president of the Council, Mrs. Harrie W. Booth.

Roseburg girls may register for one or two weeks. Camp this year will be \$12.50 per week, plus transportation. Twenty-one girls and women have been selected to act as camp instructors and most of the group include college women skilled in numerous camp crafts. The girls will be housed in small groups with a staff member in each group to be responsible for their welfare. Swimming and rowing will be at Lake Kilowan under the supervision of a Red Cross safety instructor.

Plenty of rest has been planned for the campers, as well as numerous activities.

Reservations started May 1 and the director of the Willamette area has requested that registrations be completed for camp as soon as possible as the number is necessarily limited and the camp is rapidly being filled.

Roseburg girls are asked to make their reservations by Saturday, May 11, by registering with their respective guardians and complete registrations will be mailed to the camp the first of the week. Reports Asked on War Casualties in Douglas Families

A report from every Douglas County family which suffered the loss of one or more members as casualties during the recent war is requested by the Douglas County Selective Service Board. It was announced today by Percy Croft, chairman.

Dr. C. A. Edwards, former chairman of the board, has volunteered his services to compile the honor roll.

No complete record of casualties from Douglas County has been obtainable from any official source, Dr. Edwards said today.

A partial list has been obtained, but it is desired to make the record complete.

It is the purpose of the Selective Service Board, Dr. Edwards said, to list every Douglas County man and woman killed in action or who died in service.

It is requested that families report the name of the deceased, military grade and rank, date of death, etc. Cards or letters containing this information should be mailed to the Selective Service Board, Courthouse, Roseburg.

Women Robs Graves of Flowers, Draws \$200 Fine

SEATTLE, May 10.—(P)—Mrs. Ann Johnson, 60, yesterday was fined \$200 for malicious mischief which Justice of the Peace William Hoar termed "one of the most despicable cases to come into my court." She was convicted of filling two shopping bags with flowers she took from plots on graves in Washelli Cemetery.

Mrs. Johnson insisted she had taken "just a few wilted posies." She denied she intended to sell them.

L. L. Howard, superintendent of Washelli, today estimated some \$5,000 worth of plants are stolen from graves each year. One reported recent instance was of a man who drove a truck into a cemetery here and stole every removable flower.

Dog Pulls Child From Pond, Summons Help

NEWCASTLE, N. H., May 10.—(P)—Nelli, Earl's year-old collie, Bruce, kept tugging at his trousers yesterday until Earl followed the dog to a goldfish pond. There he found three-year-old Barbara Anne James, unconscious and bleeding from a cut head. He applied artificial respiration and revived her.

Earl said the dog apparently saw the little girl tumble into the pool, striking her head as she fell. Bruce pulled her to safety and then ran for his master, a landscape gardener.

Strike Spells Death for Hungry Millions—Hoover

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—(P)—Ex-President Herbert Hoover declared today that "if this coal strike continues, hundreds of thousands of people will die in the famine areas from delayed food shipments."

Hoover, head of President Truman's famine emergency committee, arrived last night from a round-the-world survey of food needs.

He told the newsmen that if a railroad strike is called, it would mean death to millions; that if there is a shipping tieup, it would result in "a world holocaust."

Mother, Child Die in Fire

AUBURN, Wash., May 10.—(P)—Mrs. Dorothy Nobbs, 43, and a daughter, Rose, 13, burned to death when fire destroyed their three-room home here yesterday. A 15-year-old son escaped.

Farmers Seeking More Platoon Aid

SALEM, Ore., May 10.—(P)—The demand for victory farm volunteer platoons, which consist of women and children, is as great as ever, despite the increased farm labor supply, Russel M. Adams, assistant supervisor of the Oregon State College extension service farm labor program, said today.

To prove that farmers like the work done by the platoons during the war years, Adams said that farmers already have placed orders for 70 platoons, far ahead of the number of orders a year ago. There were 170 platoons used in 1945, and Adams said there would be as many or more this year, despite more farm labor being available.

Some counties already have started training platoon leaders. Platoon members are being stoned up, with a greater percentage of women than before.

The platoons will get their first work in the strawberry harvest, which will begin in about three weeks. There will be 8200 acres

of strawberries harvested this year, compared with 6600 acres in 1945.

Driver Exams Set

Driver's license examinations will be held in Roseburg two days next week—10 A. M. to 5 P. M., Tuesday, and 8 A. M. to 4 P. M., Wednesday—according to announcement by Secretary of State Farrell.

Persons wishing licenses or permits to drive are asked to get in touch with the examiner well ahead of the scheduled closing hour in order to assure completion of their applications with a minimum of delay.
