Airplane Service Established By Vets at Sutherlin

Airplane charter service, scenic rides and hops, and student instruction are offered by the Sutherlin Sky Ranch, four-and-a-half miles east of Sutherlin, owned and operated by two fliers who recently returned from service during the war in Marine Corps and AAF aviation.

The Sky Ranch is owned and operated by R. E. Kenney, ex-Army Air Force pilot, son of W. H. Kenney of Idleyde, and E. G. Nelson, formerly of St. Helens, Ore., who saw service as a Marine flier.

Ground for the airfield was purchased in March, and approval of the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics was granted for flight instruction and commercial operations the same month.

Due to the lack of suitable materials, permanent building construction has been delayed, but ranch-style office buildings are planned, they said. Maintenance and repair shops will be established in the near future.

Services now offered include charter service and flight instruction with the two airplanes now in the field, a cub plane and a Poterfield.

Portland Pushes Plans for School Budget Increase

PORTLAND, May 14.—(AP)—A school budget of \$7,868,579 for 1945-47 which includes \$1,386,463 Portland school directors hope to obtain in a special election levy or in federal grants has been approved here.

District Comptroller Andrew Comrie reported the original estimates of \$1,750,000 needed from the special election levy which was involved in a plea for a special legislature session had been revised. He said sales of foreclosed properties, heavier tax collections and payment of delinquent taxes will add \$400,000 to the district treasury during the fiscal year.

Plans for the election are going ahead under a 1917 law after the supreme court upheld the levy vote planned officially under a 1937 act. A plea for a special session of the state legislature was rejected by Governor Snell, resulting in a demonstration by teen age pupils protesting expected curtailment of school activities.

T. F. Fisher, Native Of Olalla, Passes

Thomas Fred Fisher, 84, native of Douglas County, died this morning after a lingering illness. He was born Jan. 11, 1862, at Olalla and had been engaged in the farming industry until 16 months ago when he retired. His wife, Margaret Tompkins Fisher, preceded him in death in 1933. He was a member of the Church of God.

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Paper Mills Agree To Wage Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., May 14.—(AP)—An agreement boosting pay in Pacific Coast pulp and paper mills an estimated \$1,800,000 annually was before 33 local AFL unions for ratification today.

The annual industry-wide agreement, effective June 1, was reached here Saturday by the Pacific Coast Association of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers and two AFL unions—the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, and the International Brotherhood of Papermakers.

It provides a 4 per cent increase to men workers, raising the base rate to \$1.09 hourly, and a 6 per cent increase to women, for a base rate of 90¢ cents.

The agreement, affecting 33 plants and about 15,000 workers in Oregon, Washington and California, also makes New Year's, Memorial Day, and Thanksgiving Day holidays on which time and a half will be paid if plants work. Some changes in call time, vacation, overtime, and rest periods were adopted.

Operators and the AFL unions will recommend the wage increase to the Wage Stabilization Board.
