Father Damien had spent himself for eleven full years in work among the lepers of Molokai. One morning, as he was writing one of his pleading letters to friends outside, he used the phrase, "The lepers." Suddenly he stopped, as if paralyzed. He had seen the fatal white spot on his own hand. Then he crossed out "the" and wrote, "We lepers."

Two years later when confined to a wheel chair by the ravages of the disease, he received this message: "I am coming to help, Ira Dutton." He had never heard of Ira Dutton, nor had the world. He was but a humble shoemaker in a New England hamlet. One day he picked up a leaflet which told of the work of Father Damien and his illness from the dreadful leprosy. That explained the message. For two years Ira Dutton nursed Father Damien and also carried on his work among the lepers. At the end, he laid Father Damien away in a leper's grave. For forty-four years Ira Dutton gave his all to these stricken people. Then he was laid beside Father Damien. Side by side sleep the two leper missionaries. Who having saved others, themselves they could not save.—Amen.

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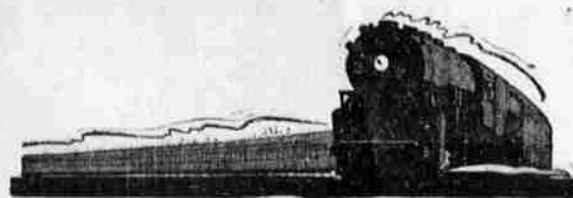
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
