Coal Operators Reject Payroll Levy Demand

problems involved."

Miners Well Paid, Claim

"A proper fund to take care of unusual hardship cases is all that is required and is all that the industry should be asked to bear," the operators said. They contended that the miners "are well paid and are able to maintain a very high standard of living and a first grade order of citizenship."

"There is no necessity for these citizens being accorded different treatment," being furnished greater privileges than those received by other citizens in the same community," they said.

The operators' committee also reminded Lewis that they had forced on March 25, six days before the coal strike began, "to agree that all operators... would accept the provisions of the workmen's compensation laws in the states wherein such acceptance is optional and to turn over all the monies collected from the mine workers for the payment of doctors, hospitals, and for similar purposes, for administration by the union."

Lewis presented his demand Monday for the payroll levy. He has asked for the payment for six purposes: Medical service, hospitalization, life and health insurance, rehabilitation training; financial aid for distressed families, and cultural and educational work among the miners.

Senator Plans Action
Senator Byrd (D-Va.) said yesterday Lewis' switch from a tonnage royalty to payroll levy demand to finance a miners' welfare fund "is the same thing only bigger."

Consequently, the Virginia senator said, he will press with renewed vigor for his proposal to outlaw any company payments to a union representative.

Offered as an amendment to the Senate's softer version of the House-approved Case bill, the Byrd measure is slated for the first of a series of Senate votes aimed at broadening and restoring teeth to strike control legislation.

NEW ORLEANS, May 15.—(AP)—The Louisiana Supreme Court declined today to interfere with the state's scheduled second attempt to electrocute Willie Francis, 18, Negro who escaped death May 3 when the electric chair failed at St. Martinville.

Home-Purchase Ban on Nisei Rapped by CIO

PORTLAND, May 15.—(AP)—The Portland Industrial Union Council (CIO) has asked the Portland Realty Board to rescind "discrimination" of race

and nationality in controlling sales of homes here.

The resolution criticizing the realty board was made after the board was told that Singery Nacamura, an American-born Japanese disabled in the Army, has been denied purchase of a Portland home because of realty board codes.

New Term Given After 52 Years in Public Office

WEST ORANGE, N. J., May 15.—(AP)—Public Safety Director Frank A. O'Connor, who was re-elected for another four-year term in yesterday's town commission election, claimed today the national record for successive years in public office.

O'Connor, who is 78 years old, has served in office 52 years, starting as assessor in 1894, he served 10 years in that post, then 18 years as town collector, and 24 years as a town commissioner.

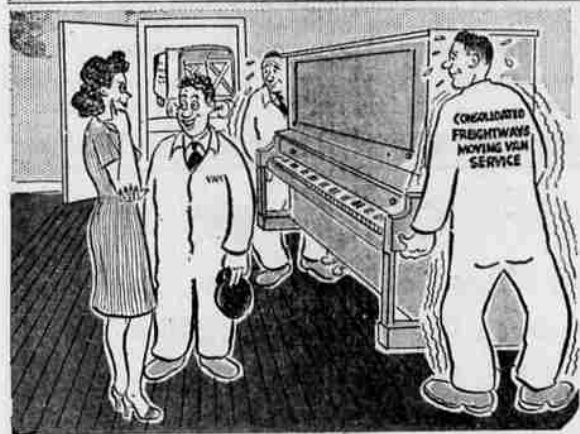
