

Dairy Products' Set-Aside Upped By Government

A 40 per cent set-aside of May and June Cheddar cheese production has been ordered for sale to government agencies to meet urgent needs overseas, County Agent J. R. Parker said today. Military agencies require 20 million pounds, and USDA needs 100 million pounds for European countries. U. S. civilians will receive 600 million pounds of Cheddar cheese, as compared with 525 mil-

lion pounds in 1945. Manufacturers of spray and roller process nonfat dry milk solids will be required to set aside 60 per cent of their May-June production.

Twenty per cent of the May production of creamery butter has been ordered set aside for sale to military agencies to enable the Army, Navy, and other war service agencies to buy butter at a time of seasonably high production. No butter will be set aside for export. The set-aside program is planned for May and June only.

"Bootlegging" of Nails In Northwest Charged

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(P)—Senator Mitchell (D., Wash.) has asked OPA to investigate reports of nail "bootlegging" in the Pacific Northwest and diversion of lumber from the Veterans' Housing program to non-essential construction.

In a letter to Price Administrator Porter, Mitchell said:

"Veterans who go to the regular yards in the Northwest are mystified when they find no lumber available. Nail bootleggers are reported to be in complete control of the nail market, despite the fact that wire steel is not scarce."

Building Activity in West Sags During April

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—(P)—Building activity faltered in the Far West during April following clamping of government controls on materials to aid housing of veterans.

Activity last month still was greater than in any other month except the record month of March in filing of permits, much of which had been hurried to get ahead of the expected government order.

April brought filing of some \$44,834,000 of new permits in the Pacific Coast's 10 largest cities, compared with \$74,026,000 in March. Last year April permits amounted to only \$9,477,000.

Medic Theorizes on Why Women Live Longer Than Men

PHILADELPHIA, May 16.—(P)—Dr. Roger I. Lee, president of the American Medical Association, has offered some of his theories on the question of "Why women live longer than men."

"The usual answers do not satisfy me," said the Boston doctor in an address before the meeting of the American College of Physicians.

"To be sure, up to the present," he said, "women do not go to war in the sense of combat. But women mostly can make the transition from their more active years to their less active years with less difficulty and less anguish."

"Women commonly are interested in their gardens, in the making of Red Cross supplies, in knitting and in the household arts and crafts. Women go to lectures at their church. They visit the sick and the unfortunate."

"They keep up the family correspondence, remember birthdays and anniversaries. They are often handy and helpful with grandchildren. These are not the activities of big business, great scholarship or of a profession, but who will say that those activities are not useful?"

Useful Life Consoling

He concluded:

"In the last analysis, the best solution we have now of a happy and contented old age is the consciousness of belonging to the world of the day, of having a part in it and of being of some use."

Discussing physical aspects of growing old, Dr. Lee said that there are now approximately 9,000,000 people in this country who are over 65, and that a white child can now be expected to live to be 65, and a white adult of 40 can expect to live to be over 70.

National Institute of Mental Health Proposed

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(P)—Legislation proposing construction of a \$10,000,000 national institute of mental health here and a \$30,000,000 annual program of grants to the states for treatment of psychiatric disorders was approved yesterday by the Senate Labor Committee.

It also approved a bill for a \$2,000,000 national institute of dental research to study causes and treatment of dental diseases.

Death Claims Dog Noted As 'Teacher' of Safety

PHILADELPHIA, May 16.—(P)—Knee-Hi, little wire-haired fox terrier which appeared before more than 12,000,000 of the nation's school pupils in safety demonstrations, died Tuesday.

The 14-year-old dog, owned by Dr. George E. Brunson, received more than 200 badges, safety

medals and certificates for her demonstrations. She showed children how she was taught to cross streets at crossings only, obey traffic signs, avoid playing in streets, and never to run in front of automobiles or play around them.
