Ferriss Blanks Detroit for Fifth Straight Victory

(By the Associated Press) Dave (Boo) Ferriss, the Boston Red Sox right-hander, had a fine start today toward becoming the first pitcher to win 20 or more games in each of his first two years in the major leagues.

Ferriss, who astounded the baseball world last year by nabbing 21 victories despite joining the Sox just a few months after receiving his Army Air Corps discharge, boasts five wins without a setback this season following his 4-0 shutout victory over the Detroit Tigers yesterday. The 24-year-old sophomore's fine performance gave the American League leaders an even break in the twin bill, for Detroit's New-houser beat the Sox 3-1 on four hits in the nightcap.

In notching his third shutout of the season, Ferriss held the Tigers, a team he has beaten six times in seven starts, to seven hits. He did not issue a base on balls and struck out five. Meara, time, the Red Sox roughed up Trout and his two successors for 10 hits.

The second place New York Yankees moved within four and a half games of the Red Sox by sweeping their doubleheader with the Indians 2-0 and 7-1. Cardinal Southpaw Win St. Louis Cards' southpaw ace, Lanier and Brecheen, turned in 5-0 and 4-0 wins over Philadelphia. The Brooklyn Dodgers dropped a full game behind the cards when they succumbed to the right-handed wizardry of Heuser, who permitted seven hits in pitching the Cincinnati Reds to a 4-0 victory.

The up-and-coming Washington Senators licked the Chicago White Sox twice 4-3 and 7-1. After blowing a 6-0 lead and losing 8-6 to Chicago's Cubs in the opener, the Boston Braves came back to win the afterpiece 5-3.

In a parade of lefthanders, Pittsburgh and the New York Giants divided a doubleheader, the Pirates winning the opener 3-1 and the Giants the second half 5-1.

Following up a 4-3 opening game decision over the St. Louis Browns, the Philadelphia Athletics unleashed an 18-hit attack to swamp the Sewellmen 13-2 in the nightcap.

Bend Wins Track Meet; Two State Records Smashed

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 20.—(AP)—Bend ranked as the 1946 state track and field champion today after a classic Saturday meet which shattered the pole vault and the 34-year-old mile record.

Bend, whose soaring George Rasmussen set a new vault record, edged out, 22 to 22, the Ashland squad paced by the new champion miler, George Fullerton. Hillsboro was third with 15. Fullerton, hitting the tape an easy 40 yards ahead of his nearest competitor, ran an amazing 4:24 mile to outpace the 4:29 state record set in 1912 by Paul Wilson of Portland's Washington High.

Rasmussen broke last year's 12 foot 3 inch pole vault record with a 12 foot 9 inch jump—but it wasn't as high as onlookers had expected. In local meets, Rasmussen had several times topped the 13-foot mark.

Jack Doyle, Hillsboro, tied the 1938 high hurdle mark with 14.9 and won the low hurdles in 23.1—only .3 of a second over that record. Doyle and Fullerton tied for individual scoring honors with 10 points each. Rasmussen came third with 9.

Roseburg High was credited with 2 points at the meet. They were posted by Chartier, who ran

fourth in the mile event, in which Fullerton, the winner, broke the 34-year-old record.
