Father of 13 Children
Re-Enlists in Air Force

TIFFIN, O., May 22.—(AP)—Ne-
vin R. Haudenschild, 35, of near-
by Republic, the highest paid
buck private before his discharge
from the Army last December, is
back in the Army air force.

Staff Sgt. Marvin R. Hedrick
of the Army recruiting service,
announcing Haudenschild's re-en-
listment, said the private's wife
and the couple's 13 children would
receive \$20 a month in family
allowances. Haudenschild, after
contributing \$22 toward his fam-
ily's support, will receive \$28 a
month.
