PORTLAND, May 23.—(P)—The Oregon & California Land Administration office today listed \$3,464,000 board feet of timber located in seven Oregon counties for sale June 11.

Chief Forester W. H. Horning said the Douglas fir tracts were in Tillamook, Clackamas, Polk, Benton, Lane, Douglas and Jackson counties.

## Clover, 'Glads' Endanger Crops of Cannery Beans

Cannery beans grown adjacent to fields of clover or commercial plantings of gladioli are almost certain to be seriously injured by the X-disease and other forms of yellow bean mosaic, according to a preliminary report on this subject just issued by the O. S. C. Experiment station as Circular of Information No. 379.

The report is made by Dr. F. P. McWhorter, plant pathologist, and Lytton Boyle, both of the experiment station staff. They say a safe distance from clover crops depends on the prevailing wind which affects insect carriers of the disease, but that 200 yards is much safer than 100 yards.

Clean culture both in and around bean fields is highly recommended as a preventive. The areas around the field are just as important as the field itself.

The same disease affects garden peas, causing a "blight" in the form of a severe mosaic that stops growth. The variety Thomas Laxton appears to be highly resistant.

## Airborn

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., May 22.—(P)—Two diaper service operators teamed up today to speed operations in Saratoga Springs and Gloversville by inaugurating air transport of diapers between their plants.

Nicholas Alexander, Saratoga Springs, does the laundry for his own service as well as that of Peter Matthews in Gloversville, about 30 miles away. They formerly carried diapers by truck. Each owns his own plane, however, and the first load of 1,400 clean diapers is scheduled to move from Saratoga Springs to Gloversville today.

## Daylight Saving Sought

PORTLAND, May 23.—(P)—The Portland Retail Trade Bureau called upon Oregon's Congressional delegation today to introduce a bill establishing national daylight saving time from May 1 to August 31 beginning next year. The bureau had backed a rejected proposal for daylight saving time in Portland.

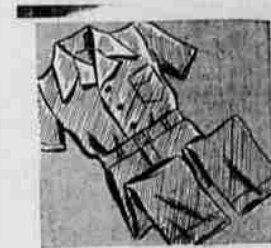
