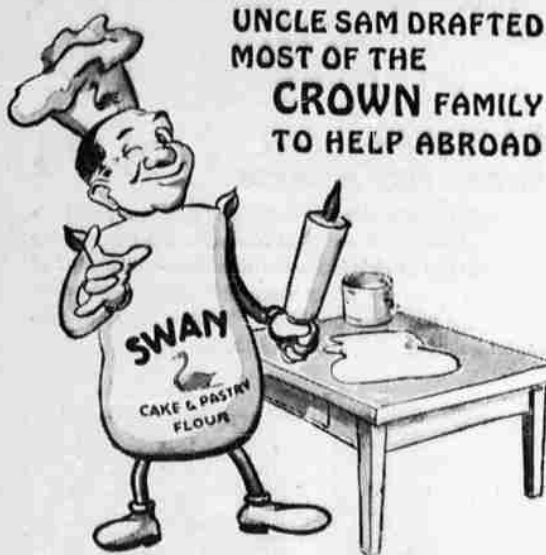

RHUBARB COOKIES

Sift together 2 cups Swan Cake & Pastry Flour, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda. Add and mix for 2 minutes. 1/2 cup shortening, 3/4 cup sugar, 1 cup sweetened stewed rhubarb. Add and beat for 2 minutes. 1 whole egg. Stir in 1/2 cup raisins. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheet and bake in moderate oven (400° F.) for about 15 minutes. This recipe will make about 6 dozen medium sized cookies.

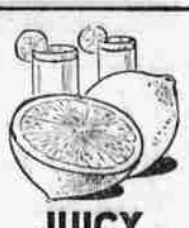

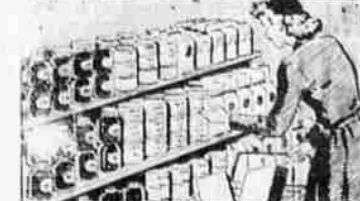

COFFEE TIPS by Carol Drake



START WITH FRESH COFFEE. Never buy more than a week ahead; use your "oldest" coffee first.



BUY THE RIGHT GRIND. Be sure your coffee is the proper grind for the coffee-maker you use.



KEEP EQUIPMENT CLEAN. Every coffee-maker should be washed daily with soap and water.



MEASURE EVERYTHING. Measure water, coffee (1 heaping tablespoon per cup is average) and brewing time.
