## H. A. Denn Fined \$50 on Contempt Of Court Charge

Henry A. Denn, Camas Valley, was fined \$50 in contempt of court Friday for violation of an order issued by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly restraining him from locking the gate on a road crossing his ranch, and claimed by his neighbors to be the only means of access to their property adjoining his land.

Denn's gate was erected January 10, 1945, and in a suit filed that month and still pending, S. L. Rose and Mary E. Rose, neighbors who used the road, claimed to have been inconvenienced to the extent of \$500 by the gate.

Judge Wimberly's original restraining order was issued January 31, 1945.

In February this year, Denn was indicted by the grand jury for threatening the commission of a felony, it being alleged that he told another neighbor, Mrs. Hattie Baum, last November, that "I will kill you," and "I will kill both of you," presumably for using the road.

On Mother's Day, May 12, the Baums charged last week, the gate was again locked. Testimony by other neighbors indicated the gate was locked for a period of an hour or more during the morning, and locked again in the afternoon.

Offers Defense  
In his own defense, Denn said he had placed the padlock on the gate to prevent vandalism by numerous fishermen and sportsmen who made "a path and boulevard of the road." But he admitted he looked for tire tracks to see if the Baums had attempted to leave. Denn said that his 10-year-old son, Tommy, had been instructed to watch for people wanting to leave, and to unlock the gate for them.

Denn's case will come up for trial on or about June 5. Judge Wimberly said, "I hope to dispose of it then once and for all." The judge did not "waste time over this very apparent violation of a court order and levied the fine to 'teach some respect for decrees of the court.'"
