OPA Extension Without Changes Asked by Truman

WASHINGTON, May 27—(AP)—President Truman called upon the Senate Friday for prompt extension of OPA for a full year without amendments that would "jeopardize economic stability."

In a letter to Chairman Wagner (D-N. Y.) of the Senate Banking Committee, the president said he could not approve the OPA extension legislation as passed by the House because it would mean "a quick end" of price control.

The White House appeal was read to the Senate shortly before the Banking Committee resumed consideration of the OPA bill.

Noting that Congress has been considering the legislation for 15 weeks the chief executive said: "I earnestly repeat my earlier request that the Congress quickly re-enact the stabilization laws without amendments that would jeopardize economic stability. I ask, too, that as president I do not be handicapped by amendments destroying my authority to bear responsibility for effective coordinated administration of the laws in those departments and agencies of the government which I believe can best carry out the stabilization policies."

California Ram Sales Set New Record Prices

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27—(AP)—All records for total sales at the California ram sale were broken last week at the 26th annual sale at Galt, where 1,837 head sold for a total of \$117,424.50 the California Wool Growers Association announced today.

The top ram at the sale, a Suffolk consigned by Charles Howland and sons of Cambridge, Idaho, sold for \$625 to R. B. Burroughs of Homedale, Idaho.

The second high, a Hampshire at \$500, was consigned by R. W. Hogg and sons of Salem, Ore., and sold to Walter P. Hubbard of Junction City, Ore.

The Hoggas also scored with the highest-priced pen, a lot of 10 which sold to Pierre Harguindey of Fresno, Calif., for \$150 a head.

The average for the 1,837 head of rams and ewes was \$69.08, compared with a \$59.72 average last year and \$54.55 average the year before.

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Pay Hike Given Portland Waterfront Workers

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27—(AP)—A wage agreement retroactive to October 1, 1944, will give CIO checkers and supercargoes a 5-cent-an-hour raise, R. E. Ferguson, waterfront employers manager, said Friday.

The overtime increase will be 73 cents. Men loading explosives at Beaver Dock will receive penalty payments of \$1.15 an hour, he reported.

The increase affects about 310 men, Ferguson said. A union proposal for a new contract embody-

ing other changes is expected next week.

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
