THERE is one hopeful sign in the sky. The New York stock market on the first day of the strike sold off fractions to two points or more at the opening, but liquidation was light, and recoveries appeared before noon.

That can only mean that people STILL HAVE CONFIDENCE IN THIS COUNTRY and are still willing to back their confidence with their money. They simply refuse to believe that we are going to go on and destroy ourselves.

PROTECTION OR BETRAYAL?

Is the rank and file of labor being LED or MISLED in the current wave of contagious disputes plaguing the country? Are the leaders who promote these uprisings seriously concerned in improving the condition of the worker or are they striving for political prestige and power?

We should be concerned with the confusion about us. We should determine whether we are in the midst of an epidemic of only semi-related labor disorders, or are victims of a deliberate and premeditated radical plot directed at the overthrow of our existing system of government through creation of confusion and chaos until, in our frantic desire for peace, we surrender authority to the radical minority.

There is no question but that greed and selfishness on the part of management, in former years, forced organization of the worker for his own protection. Man's inhumanity to man was never demonstrated more forcibly than in the sweat shops, the child labor factories, the long hours and low pay which marked industrial and business conditions of a few years ago.

It is the responsibility of labor leaders to strive for improvement in the working and living standards of the laboring man. But what is the condition today? Our industrial machinery could be running at utmost capacity, furnishing jobs for everyone who wanted to work, producing prosperity and high standards of living.

There would be less cause for criticism had the strikes been necessary to gain equitable concessions for the workers, but such was not the case. We have had few strikes which could not have been averted by more prolonged negotiations. In our recent lumber strike, for instance, one of the factors delaying settlement was rivalry between two of the labor leaders.

Are the workers to be made pawns in the game of politics played by their leaders? The place of labor in politics is rationalized by its leaders on the grounds that political control is a necessary part of protection. But the trend of today's movement is towards nationalization of industry and business, and history proves that socialization—centralization of power, public ownership and regimentation—is labor's greatest enemy.

Where, then, is labor being led? Is it being led to its own destruction, carrying with it the fundamental forms of our free government? Is it being betrayed by those to whom it looks for protection?

Proposed OPA Changes Criticized by Bowles. WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—Chester Bowles, economic stabilization director, said yesterday that changes in OPA legislation by the Senate Banking Committee were "seven worse than the bill passed by the House."

Bowles said the House measure trimming and extending OPA powers "would have made the control of inflation flatly impossible." Now, he declared in a statement, the Senate committee, "has been quietly and effectively cutting the heart out of price control."

Senator Morse Brands Truman As 'Ham Actor'

WASHINGTON, May 18.—(AP)—Senator Morse of Oregon told the Senate yesterday President Truman put on "one of the cheapest exhibitions of ham acting I have ever seen."

Morse broke into a denunciation of the President's emergency legislation by Senator Downey (D., Calif.) to assert that it was known at the White House before noon Saturday that the rail strikers were willing to go back to work on terms laid down by the President.

Downey went ahead with his address but a few minutes later Senator Hatch (D., N. M.) got the floor to protest Morse's remarks. He demanded they be stricken from the record.

Hatch said he realized that all senators are under great strain and likely to say and do things not intended. But Hatch said, the strain upon the President is "one hundred times greater."

Hatch added that it was his information that only "purely tentative offers" had been made prior to Mr. Truman's appearance before congress.

Morse later told reporters off the Senate floor that he had "definite information from the brotherhoods" that they had delivered to President Truman's advisers at the White House before noon Saturday their acceptance of the terms upon which the strike finally was settled.

Courts Can Ban Ouster of Tenant Pending Appeal

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday ruled federal courts can prevent eviction of tenants pending appeals based on OPA rules.

In one case the government contended Robert C. Beever was evicted improperly from his apartment after the landlord began proceedings before a Covington, Ky., justice of the peace to regain possession.

The U. S. Circuit Court said it could do nothing because at the time it considered the case the tenant had left the apartment. In the other case OPA had sought to restrain eviction of a tenant from a Columbus, Ohio, house, owned by the estate of Emma Gang. The circuit court denied OPA's request for an injunction.

Retail Prices of Dairy Products to Rise, Prediction

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—The government is on the verge of letting prices go up a cent a quart for milk and 10 to 12 cents a pound for butter.

Disposing this yesterday, officials who withheld use of their names, said also that cheese will cost about 5 cents a pound more. These officials, predicting an announcement in a day or so, cited two reasons for the decision to boost retail price ceilings:

1. Grain and feed price increases earlier this month hiked dairy production costs. 2. Price stabilization officials have decided it would be futile to try to put through any new food subsidies in view of the opposition in Congress.

On the basis of the latter point, previous plans for a dairy subsidy increase July 1 are being withdrawn. "This," officials said, will account for about half of the imminent price jump.

Later Bowles was persuaded to authorize grain price increases in a move to obtain more food for famine relief. He gave in when the agriculture department contended that farm payments granted for wheat and corn were not turning the trick.

Bowles indicated on April 15 that there would be no dairy product price increases before July 1. What happened at that time, he said, depended on what Congress did about subsidies.

He reportedly is convinced now that there will not be sufficient subsidy money available to continue present food payments.

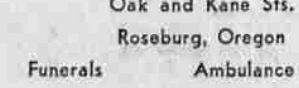
