Rev. H. P. Sconce Meets Notables on His Eastern Trip

Rev. H. P. Sconce, pastor of the Roseburg Baptist Church, who was mentioned in newspapers throughout the nation recently when he called upon President Truman, presented fresh trout from Oregon, and carried a letter of personal greeting from Mr. Truman to the president's mother, is to return to Roseburg in time to fill his pulpit at the regular church services Sunday.

He will speak Sunday morning on the subject, "The Love of Christ," and in the evening on the topic, "A Friend of Mine," which will include a recital of his visit with the President at the White House.

The Rev. Mr. Sconce writes from Kansas City that he spoke to the Breakfast Club in Congress, where he met with Senators Wayne Morse and Guy Cordon, while Congressman Ellsworth paid for his breakfast. In addition to a personal interview with the President, he attended two press conferences, and had talks with Fulton Lewis, Jr., Herbert Hoover, and other prominent people.

He carried a personal letter to Mrs. Truman, the President's mother, visiting with her and her daughter in their home at Grandview, Mo. He also carried the President's personal message to the 7,000 delegates at the Northern Baptist convention in Grand Rapids, Mich.

The Roseburg pastor, an enthusiastic outdoors man, managed to widely advertise Douglas

County's myrtlewood, fir timber and recreational resources. He is being accompanied home by Robert Forrester, Roseburg, and Dr. Ralph Walker of the White Temple, Portland.

Street Signs Job Awaits Arrival of Item of Material

Only the shipment of a 50-yard roll of "Scotchlite" from St. Paul, Minn., delays Roy Huffham, local sign painter, from completing 500 street signs which were authorized by the city council last month.

The "Scotchlite" has been shipped, Huffham was notified last week, by the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co., which turns out the reflecting material widely used for city and county traffic signs. The Seattle sales office of the company did not have the material in the quantity required by Roseburg and requisitioned its St. Paul headquarters for the shipment now on its way.

The material, which comes in 50-yard rolls, 30 inches wide, reflects sunlight and automobile head lamps. It will be attached to the 500 boards which Huffham has now painted with two coats of white.

Huffham will paint the signs by a silk screen process. Cut-out letters forming names of streets will be laid over the silk as a stencil, and with one or two sweeps of the brush, each sign will be painted. Letters will be white on a dark background.

Even though the painting of the signs has been delayed by the shipment of the "Scotchlite" Huffham feels he will still be ahead of

George Frew, superintendent of streets, has been delayed in digging the holes at street intersections to support the metal standards on which signs will be mounted, he explained recently. The metal standards are 350 angle irons which the city acquired through the Douglas County Farm Bureau. To each

has been applied its red prime, and coat of white paint. They are 10 feet long, will be sunk 18 inches in cement to hold them in place, two at each street intersection throughout the city. What delays the street department in erecting the signs, Frew said, is the manpower shortage. However, the signs will go up as fast as his crew can put them up, he promised.
