Swim Classes to Begin Here June 15; Teacher Obtained

Swimming classes in the South Umpqua river, at the foot of Temple St., will start Saturday morning at 8 o'clock, June 15, it was announced by H. W. Gray, city recreational director.

Classes will be conducted by Eddie Wyatt, graduate in physical education of the University of Oregon. Before instructions will be given to any person, a physician's certificate showing recent typhoid inoculations, heart check, and ear examinations must be presented.

Wyatt was formerly director of water safety and lifesaving in Lane county for two years, and taught swimming in Lane county for a total of four years. He has completed three American Red Cross aquatic schools, two in Washington state, one in southern California.

While he was at the University of Oregon, he taught swimming classes there during one school year.

During the war, Wyatt served as a member of underwater demolition teams in the Navy, and later was a staff swimming instructor for all underwater teams. Upon his return to the United States, he was ordered to Camp Elliott, Calif. where, as physical training officer, he had charge of two large swimming pools and athletic areas.

Local swimming schedules will be announced later.

Samuel Heath, Veteran of World War 1, Passes

Sporer tightened up, however, with the bases full, and struck out two batters to retire the side. 'Famine Bread' Loaves Now on Sale in Oregon

PORTLAND, June 3.—(AP)—The new "famine bread" loaves were on Oregon store shelves today.

The loaves, weighing 14.4 ounces instead of one pound, were ordered by the Department of Agriculture in slashing 10 per cent from the nation's bread basket.

Loaves will carry the customary pound weight on the wrapper until new wrappers can be made. Meanwhile, bakers will post the new bread size on cards displayed in stores.

It is estimated that there are 50,000 distributors of fluid milk in the United States and 40,000 plants processing milk, butter, cheese, ice cream, and other dairy products.

Parcels Now Mailable to U. S. Zone in Germany

Roseburg post office has received word that ordinary parcels may now be sent to the American occupied zone of Germany except the American sector of Berlin, Postmaster L. L. Wimberly reports. The limit on size is eleven pounds in weight and 72 inches length and girth combined. Only one parcel may be sent per week from the same address to the same addressee. The usual customs declaration tags are required showing the contents which must be confined to non-perishable foods and such items as soaps, medicine and clothing. Parcels must also be plainly marked as gift parcels. The rate of postage is 14 cents per pound and all possible information is required to address. Parcels which are not delivered to addressee will not be returned but will be given to authorized Germany relief organizations.
