Grain-Short Mills to Receive Loans of Wheat

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to the mill after it has exhausted all possibilities of obtaining additional supplies.

Requests for wheat will be considered only in the case of mills having wheat and flour totaling less than one-half the authorized June grain for domestic distribution.

Export Phase Involved

The government wheat will be supplied mills through merchandizers acting as agents for the government in handling the bonus wheat.

The department also will supply wheat to mills in position to expedite millings for export to shortage areas. The wheat will be released (1) to mills that will grind their own wheat and furnish the export flour immediately to the government—such wheat to be replaced by the government later, and (2) to mills that are in direct line of export where there will be no delay in milling government wheat while it is in transit for export.

Both Parties Claim Victory in Italy's Vote

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28,000,000 voters had turned out yesterday. Minister of the Interior Romita described the balloting as "perfectly free of incidents."

Only one election death was reported and that was accidental. A voter waiting in line at a polling booth near Viterbo was killed when the firearm of a policeman with whom he was talking went off.

Eight persons were hurt, two seriously, when a platform collapsed under a group of voters at Venasca. A party candidate for the assembly, Eduardo Falaci, was badly injured in a high-way accident near Florence.

Police at Milan and one or two other places reported that even common crimes were fewer than usual.

Strike Control Bill Bounces Back in House

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powers to seize essential plants if work stoppages occur and to draft individuals necessary to run them. The Senate deleted the draft authority, but left in the power to take over industries.

Both bills require union and management leaders to take "affirmative" action to halt work stoppages in plants seized by the government.

The measure now is awaiting House action again, but Speaker Rayburn said no conclusive decision is expected until at least Thursday. At that time the House may decide whether to accept the Senate version or send the two drafts to a conference committee

to work out a compromise. Mr. Truman told Sen. Radcliffe (D-Md.) Saturday that the Senate emasculated his bill. Key House members who have controlled previous labor legislation declared, however, that they doubted whether Congress would agree to anything stronger than the Senate version unless new strikes develop.

Meanwhile, the fate of this legislation remained closely tied in with the long-range case labor dispute bill which Congress sent to the President last week.

Several administration spokesmen on Capitol Hill have said they expected the President to veto the measure. The author, Rep. Case (R-S. D.), commented, however, that "it is inconceivable to me" that the Chief Executive would reject it.

Maritime Leaders Ask Aid Abroad in Strike Plan

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maritime unions, sent a cablegram to the World Federation of Trade Unions (WFTU) at Paris. In that message they renewed their criticism of Mr. Truman's assertion that he will operate the merchant ships with the armed forces if necessary. They said the President had "seriously jeopardized" the possibilities for a peaceful settlement.

And they asked the WFTU in the event of a strike to declare any merchant vessels manned by the U. S. government to be "scab ships." They also asked for any other help the WFTU could give.

The CIO is affiliated with the WFTU (the AFL isn't). Also affiliated are millions of union members in Russia, Britain,

France and other countries. The WFTU executive council has a meeting scheduled in Moscow on June 16-18.

It was not clear today whether the WFTU would—or could—influence the dock workers of Europe, for example, to refuse to load and unload American ships.

Joint Strike Voted

Bridges and Curran are co-chairmen of the "committee for maritime unity." This organization was formed three weeks ago by six CIO unions and one independent union. Four of the CIO unions and the independent group have voted a joint strike.

The most important unions in the group are Bridges' Longshoremen—strong on the West Coast—and Curran's National Maritime Union, which includes seamen of Atlantic, Gulf, and Great Lakes ports.

Up to now, all the negotiations at the Labor Department have involved the National Maritime Union's demands on the Atlantic and Gulf ship operators. The union has demanded a 40-hour week for seamen—with overtime beyond 40 hours—and basic wage increases ranging from 22 cents an hour to 35 cents.

The seamen now work from 56 to 63 hours at sea and 44 hours in port. Yesterday's negotiating session

was devoted to the work week issue.

Edgar L. Warren, director of the U. S. Conciliation Service, telling reporters the ship operators have "not yet" offered a counter-proposal, implied they may do so. The operators have rejected a 40-hour week as "impossible."

(The Moscow radio, as heard in London, quoted a Tass dispatch to Izvestia as saying that an embargo by the U. S. on the shipment to Russia of industrial reparations from the U. Argentine Bid Accepted

Pravda, communist party organ, said Russia had replied favorably to a request from Argentina for the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries, and added:

"It is quite characteristic that that American newspapers, expressing the views of reactionary circles, accepted with dissatisfaction the campaign in the Ar-

gentine press for the establishment of diplomatic relations with the U. S. S. R., seeing in this movement characteristic Argentine efforts to oppose pressure from the side of the U. S. and to protect its national independence."

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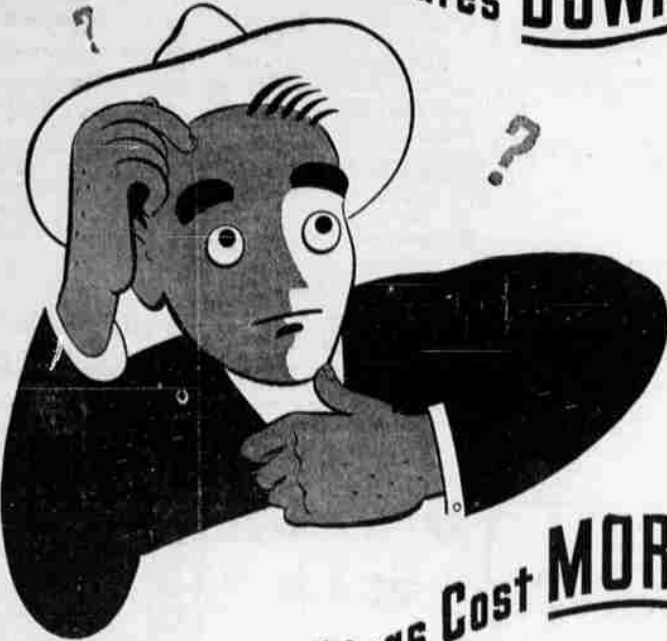

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ARMED FORCES VOLUNTARY RECRUITMENT ACT

- Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
- Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
- An increase in the reenlistment bonus to \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
- Up to 90 days' paid furlough, depending on length of service, with travel paid to home and return, for men who reenlist within the prescribed time after discharge.
- A thirty-day furlough each year with full pay.
- Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to reenlist.
- Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$155.25 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
- Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights for men who enlist before October 6, 1946. A 4-year college, trade or business school course, with expenses paid, at the end of a 3-year enlistment.
- Family allowances for the term of enlistment for dependents of men who enlist or reenlist before July 1, 1946.
