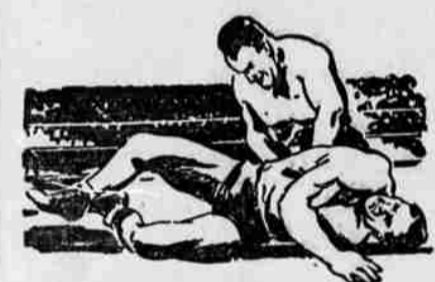
Mrs. G. W. Marshall, worthy matron, will preside. Refreshments will be served at the close of the meeting. Members and visiting members are invited.

Dispute Over Pay Shuts Ketchikan Restaurants

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, June 5.—(AP)—Ketchikan restaurants and cafes were nearly all closed today in a wage dispute.

Owners said they were unable to meet demands of the AFL-CIO Culinary Workers Union for this scale: Cooks, \$14 a day, compared with the present \$12; waitresses, \$8, compared with \$6 to \$6.50; and dishwashers, \$9.50, compared with \$6.50. Restaurant employees have also been getting three meals daily.

The owners said they would remain closed until a new contract is negotiated. Only a few cafes in the natives' section remained open.

Insured Vets Urged to Check on 'War Clause'

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—The State Veterans' Department urged returning servicemen today to check with their insurance agents regarding "war clauses" which exist in some insurance contracts.

Certain special benefit provisions might have been automatically suspended during the war, and might be reinstated only by application of the veteran.

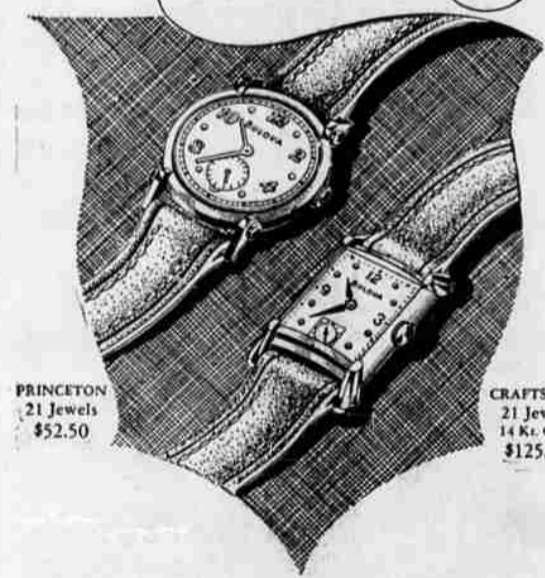
