Notice of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution

(Summary of Section 11, Article XI, on reverse side)

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 19-C of Douglas County, State of Oregon, at City Hall in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the year 1947 over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are:

The amount, \$52,207.50, necessary to balance the budget exceeds the maximum allowable under 6% limitation law.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said year is \$38,413.40.
