Phone Operator Hotel Fire Heroine

CHICAGO, June 6.—(P)—Mrs. Julia C. Barry, heroine telephone operator who remained at her switchboard in the La Salle hotel warning guests of the fire which swept the building until she died from smoke, will be considered for the Theodore N. Vail award, Illinois Bell Telephone officials said today.

The telephone company said Mrs. Barry's devotion to duty during yesterday morning's fire "undoubtedly saved hundreds of lives, although it meant the loss of her own."

Mrs. Barry, a widow and mother of a 16-year-old son Jack, resisted rescue efforts of W. H. Bradford, assistant night manager, telling him: "No, I'm going to stay at my station." Bradford later found her unconscious and was burned trying to save her.

The Vail award, established by the late president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, is given annually to those engaged in telephone work who have performed outstanding acts of public service.

Meanwhile, the Chicago Sun, starting a fund to pay for her son's education, contributed \$500.

"Good afternoon, gin? whiskey?" In Valognes they tell again and again the story that has made them laugh so often in the past two years — how an unknown American soldier roared up on his motorcycle to one of the few houses still standing in the town

and told the family inside: "You'd better get out of here, the Germans are coming." When the family left he flopped down on the big feather bed. "There are any Germans within 10 miles of here," he said, "but I just have to get some sleep."

olds; the House by a 195 to 96 tally ordered a halt to teenage inductions. The top draft age in the House bill is 29; in the Senate, 44.

Pay raises: The Senate wrote into its bill pay raises for enlisted grades only, ranging from 50 per cent for buck privates to smaller boosts for top sergeants and corresponding ranks in the other services. The House refused to put pay raises into the draft bill but voted in separate legislation for raises ranging from 50 per cent for buck privates to 10 per cent for five-star generals.

Induction "holiday": the House ordered a moratorium on all inductions prior to October 15. The Senate turned that proposal down.

viewed as extremely serious. The purpose apparently was to protest the fact that Pacific ship operators are in Washington for the CIO talks and have not returned to San Francisco to begin negotiations with the Sailors Union of the Pacific.

Union Offer Rejected As maritime labor troubles spread rapidly, the news in Washington included:

1. Eastern ship operators last night rejected the latest undisclosed offer of the CIO National Maritime Union. It was believed to call for overtime pay after 44 hours a week at sea, instead of the original union demand of 40 hours. The operators insist on the present 56-hour standard work week at sea.

2. The House Labor Committee scheduled a meeting to discuss the whole maritime situation. This was the first official action on Capitol Hill with respect to the threatened strike.

3. President Truman called on the CIO Maritime Unions and the employers to "buckle down and settle this matter through collective bargaining."

He said late yesterday he thought it could be settled in that way. Declaring that the Labor Department is handling the dispute, the President added all steps by other agencies are "purely precautionary."

Price Control Extension Heads for Senate Fight

features of the House bill, condemned as "monstrous" by St. Louis Director Bowles even before its completion:

1. Price control over livestock, meat, poultry, eggs and dairy products would end this June 30.

2. The secretary of agriculture rather than the price administration would say what other farm products could be kept under price ceilings.

3. A decontrol board, independent of OPA, would be established with power to overturn the price administrator's refusal to lift controls from any specific commodity.

4. "Cost absorption" would be out. OPA would be forbidden to interfere with normal markups and discounts of wholesalers and retailers of so-called "reconversion items." These include automobiles, refrigerators, radios, washing machines and similar items whose war-time production was curtailed 25 per cent or more by government order.

5. The \$2,000,000,000 in subsidies requested by OPA would be cut to \$1,100,000,000, with a provision that no food subsidies could be paid after May 1, 1947.

6. OPA's controversial "MAP" (maximum average price) order, designed to keep the manufacture of low priced clothing going, would be repealed.

7. OPA could not put any item under control which was not controlled May 1 this year, and could inaugurate no new subsidies.

8. Items not important to living costs or business costs must be taken out from under price control by the end of this year.

Naval Officer Found Shot To Death by Own Rifle

BREMERTON, Wash., June 6.

(P)—Comdr. Max Chapman Mather, U. S. N., executive officer of the naval ammunition depot, was found shot to death in bed yesterday with a .22-calibre target rifle at his side, Deputy Sheriff E. E. Miller said.

His wife, Virginia, had arisen earlier and gone downstairs with their 4-year-old twin daughters, Ann and Mary.

Commander Mather took the rifle from the family car two days ago saying he wanted to use it for target practice on the beach, his wife said.

Rainbow Trout Take at Diamond Lake Reported

PORTLAND, June 6.—(P)—Five and a half million Rainbow trout eggs were taken from Diamond Lake by a State Game Commission crew, working there since April, the commission reported today. Most of the fish hatched will be returned to that lake.
