REEDSPORT—At the regular monthly meeting of the Port of Umpqua commissioners, it was decided definitely to sell the port pilot boat, Tiger, which for the past three years has been of little use, as shipping here has been at a virtual standstill because of the poor condition of the Umpqua River bar.

The boat has been leased several times to local deep sea fishermen, but the leasing arrangements netted the port little revenue, so it was definitely decided to sell the boat at public auction under sealed bids, with a minimum sale price set at \$6,000. Bids will be opened June 17.

Skiing Planned on Reedsport Dunes

REEDSPORT—Just as soon as full information can be received and equipment ordered, the sport of sand skiing will be inaugurated on the sand dunes in the vicinity of Reedsport, and a new sport will be introduced on the second largest sand dunes in the United States located just southwest of this city in the Light House State Park.

These dunes are under constant study by the University of Minnesota and monthly measurements of their shifting are recorded and sent to the university.

R. C. Burling, a local young man who during the war was with the Army ski troops with service in Italy and other European mountain battle fields, is to have charge of the experiment under the sponsorship of the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce.

As soon as data can be secured and the proper equipment installed, fun loving sportsmen can receive instructions in skiing and enjoy the fun right on the sand dune beaches of Douglas County, in the salt breeze of the wide Pacific, in the summer sun, without danger of frost bites, chilblains or snow blindness.
