

Oaks Two Games Ahead of Seals at Close of Series

The San Francisco Seals, battling for first place, wound up Sunday's season two games behind the Oakland Oaks but with a 4-3 edge in their series.

The Seals looked bad in the first go-around, with Cotton Pippin limiting them to five hits. The Oaks took the game 5 to 0, but not before a first-class brawl, beginning with Ferris Pahn and Pippin and winding up with both teams and a dozen spectators taking part in the fun. Reasons for clouting were vague but it appeared that nobody was hurt.

In the afternoon show, Fain won the ball game for San Francisco, tripling down the left field foul line to score Ted Jennings from first and gave O'Doul's tribe a 2 to 1 victory.

Sam Bread's single and Jack Angle's steal home won the opening game 7 to 5 for San Diego over the Seattle Rainiers, and the Padres returned to take the seven-inning nightcap 6 to 4. Vernon Kennedy, relief pitcher in each game, got credit for both victories.

Los Angeles took both games of a doubleheader with the Sacramento Solons, taking the first game 2 to 1 and dropping the nightcap, 5 to 3. Harvey Storey's home run won the first game for the Beavers. Jo Jo White won the second game for the Solons with three doubles and a triple.

Joe Louis Looks Slow but Declares He'll Beat Conn

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., June 10.—(AP)—It would appear that after 10 years as champion and one month of training for what figures to be his toughest defense, Joe Louis has finally discovered there are 15 rounds in a title fight, and it may be a good idea to get ready for all 15 of them.

For the first time since he came down the pike to build the greatest heavyweight championship record in history, the Bomber boxed more than six rounds at a sitting, both Saturday and Sunday, as he polished up for his June 19th beat-busting date with Billy Conn.

He said it was "only because I feel real good." And it is in the books, too, that when he had to go 15 rounds in the past to keep his crown from being knocked off, he did it without having to call for help—notably against Tommy Farr and Arturo Godoy.

Yet, there is no doubt that during his drills, Joe has looked only slow—and calling him slow is giving him all the best of it. He has 32-year-old legs now, too. What's more, he has heard that Conn comes as close to looking like greased lightning as anyone can wearing 16-ounce gloves and silk pants. And while Farr and Godoy were nice fellows and good to their folks, neither is a Billy Conn. In the art of getting around.

After he finished, Louis got around to talking about Conn somewhat, even to admitting that he knows how he was behind in his conditioning when Billy took him almost to the end of his title run last time out.

"But I was just a good light-heavyweight then," Joe went on, "now he's grow'd up into a good heavyweight."

"But I'm gonna beat him. I'm getting in shape for 15 rounds. If the chance comes before then, of course, I think I'll take advantage of it."

Grain Dealers Oppose Bureaucratic Decrees

SPOKANE, June 8.—(AP)—A resolution declaring that "through wise laws the government can regulate business without dominating it" was passed yesterday by delegates to a meeting of the Pacific Northwest Grain Dealers' Association.

Bosox Twice Beat Detroit to Boost Their League Lead

The onrushing Boston Red Sox, barring a sudden collapse, had at least an outside chance today of breaking three coveted standards—winning the most games in one season, winning the pennant by the largest margin, and clinching the flag at the earliest date.

Having already pocketed 39 of their first 48 games for a remarkable .813 average following yesterday's sweep of their doubleheader with the Detroit Tigers, the Red Sox can better the Chicago Cubs' 1906 major league record of 116 victories by winning 78 of their remaining 106 contests, or in other words play .736 ball from here on in. That would be about 80 percentage points lower than their present gait. The American League record, 110 victories, was set by the New York Yankees in 1927.

The twin triumph over the world champion Tigers—by 7-1 and 11-6 scores—extended the Red Sox's latest winning streak to 10 games, five short of their early-season consecutive string. With the Sox pounding five Detroit pitchers for 25 hits including the 11th and 12th homers for Ted Williams, southpaw Mickey Harris and righthander Dave Ferriss had an easy time registering their ninth and 10th victories respectively.

Cubs Also Coming Fast
Although dwarfed by the Red Sox' sensational streak, the Chicago Cubs are working on a winning streak of their own that has pulled the defending National League champions to within three and a half games of the top. Defeating the first place Brooklyn Dodgers 7-6 in 10 innings for their third straight over the Flatbushers, the Bruins ran their streak to seven in a row and moved up to within a half game of the second place St. Louis Cardinals.

Splitting two games with the rejuvenated Philadelphia Phils, the Cards had to be satisfied with only a half game gain on the Dodgers who now lead by three games. The Red Birds captured the first game 9-1 slugging a pair of Philly hurlers for 13 hits but were held to five hits in the finale by Schoolboy Rowe as Ben Chapman's lads won 3-1.

Washington's jinx over the Chicago White Sox finally came to an end as the Sox split with the Senators, winning the second game 8-1 after the Capital City crew captured the opener 7-1.

Umpires Banish Ott
Manager Mel Ott was thrown out of both games by the umpires as his New York Giants dropped a double bill to the Pittsburgh Pirates 2-1 and 5-1. Fritz Ostermuller won his fifth game in the opener, Johnny Lanning, who replaced Ken Heintzleman in the second inning of the finale after the portside had been carried off the field when hit on the right cheekbone by a line drive, held the Giants scoreless the rest of the way to gain his first victory.

The Cincinnati Reds retained their fourth place position by dividing two games with Boston's Braves. After Johnny Sain pitched and batted his way to a 1-0 win for Boston in the opener, Cincinnati's Ewell Blackwell outdueled Si Johnson 1-0 in the nightcap.

The St. Louis Browns and Philadelphia Athletics split two, the Browns winning the first, 6-2, behind Denny Galehouse, and the A's annexing the nightcap, 8-4, with Phil Marchildon on the mound.

In Circus Spotlight With Husband

Two hostile lords of the jungle, each a natural enemy of the other, are made to perform in the same arena in a featured display with the Clyde Beatty Railroad Circus coming to Roseburg Friday, June 14, at the Garden Valley Road and Walnut Street grounds.

Schools Told How To Aid in Famine Relief Program

Douglas county schools can contribute to the famine relief program by using more home and community-canned foods in school lunch programs next year, according to John H. Ferguson, chairman of the county A.C.A. committee and emergency food program manager for the county.

Since schools can obtain sugar for that purpose, Mr. Ferguson urged sponsoring groups and individuals to increase canning for school lunches to ease demand on commercial stocks needed for famine relief.

In addition, he pointed out, a stepped-up school lunch canning program will assure well-balanced meals at lower cost for children, and will help prevent waste of seasonally-abundant fruits and vegetables.

Schools apply to the state OPA office for allotments of canning sugar for use by the school or by groups which are willing to process foods donated to or purchased by the school. One pound of sugar will be granted for every four quarts of finished canned fruit or juice, plus an amount for making jams and jellies not to exceed 5 pounds for each 1,000 meals served in 1945. As soon as the canning is completed, the school reports to the OPA on the amount actually canned.

The chairman said that his office would be glad to cooperate in providing information on foods that become abundant as the crops are harvested during the coming season, so that plans can be made for increased canning of those that might be in surplus supply.

Achiu-Katonen Go Of Judo Type Ends In "No Contest"

A ruling of "no contest" ended the judo-type wrestling match between Walter Achiu and Paavo Katonen—the first of its kind ever staged in the city—at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night, after the first of three scheduled falls had been registered by Achiu. The second round—and the combat as well—ended when Katonen, caught in a strangle hold, such as subdued him in the opening stanza, hurled Achiu over the ropes and onto the floor in front of first-row spectators. Achiu, falling to rally, was carried to the dressing room on the shoulders of Referee Elton Owen and was unable to return after the prescribed rest period.

The major foul committed by Katonen in throwing his opponent over the ropes caused Referee Owen and the city boxing commission to unite in a verdict of "no contest." This perforce "froze" the prize money, evoking vehement protest from the Finn, who was also forced to withstand a barrage of jeers from the pro-Achiu crowd. And the volume of jeers was in proportion to the size of the audience, which overtaxed the seating capacity of the Armory and was estimated at more than 1,000. During the "razzing" of the Finn, a ball of compressed tin-foil thrown at him missed its mark and struck a woman spectator, smashing one of the lenses of her glasses and leaving a bruise about her eye.

Judo-type wrestling varies chiefly from the regular catch-as-catch-can method in that it legitimizes nerve-torturing jitsu and chopping blows with the edges of the hands. The combatants also wear, in addition to trunks, what look like abbreviated nightgowns, and with these they are allowed to affix strange holds or blood circulation-arresting tourniquets. Achiu demonstrated his mastery over the Finn in this type of battle, but Katonen retaliated with outright slugging and head butts, and did not hesitate to seek refuge in the ropes when unable to break a hold in any other way.

Achiu twisted on the "Shanghai necktie" to gain the first fall in 7:28. He had the Finn in the clutch of another in the second round when he was hurled over the ropes in the time of 18:58. A re-match is necessary and probably will be held to "thaw out" the prize money.

Kiser Beats Nazarian
In the catch-as-catch-can opener of the card, Jack Kiser won from Mike Nazarian, a wild and wooly Armenian as full of meanness as his hair is of kinks. A trio of drop kicks, followed by a jack-knife clamp, gave Kiser the first fall in 14:42. The Armenian got the second fall with a half-Boston

crab hold in 18:38 after headlocking and mauling Kiser into helplessness and leaving a severe gash over his right eye. Ignoring the referee's warnings, Nazarian resumed his foul tactics when the third round opened, wrenching off the bandage that had been placed over Kiser's eye, and was apparently on his way to another fall, when Owen intervened at the end of 3:03 and awarded the verdict to Kiser.

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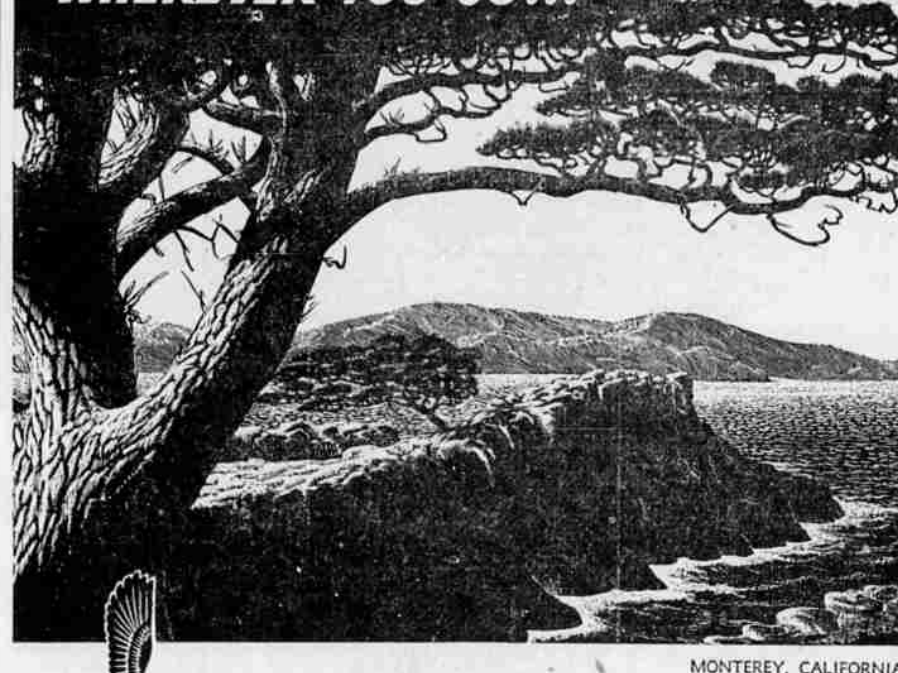
