Accident Fatal To Jack Johnson, Ex-Boxing Champ

RALEIGH, N. C., June 11.—(AP) Jack Johnson, the world's first Negro heavyweight boxing champion, is dead, but probably the controversy which sprang from his scrap with Jess Willard 30 years ago will continue as long as men battle each other in the ring. The ex-champion, 68, died here yesterday of injuries suffered when his automobile struck a light pole and overturned near Franklinton while en route to New York from Texas, where he recently had concluded a personal appearance tour. Fred L. Scott, a Negro companion, was treated for minor injuries. Johnson's wife, Mrs. Irene Johnson, arranged for sending the body to Chicago where she resides. Johnson became the world's champion when he defeated Tommy Burns of Canada in 14 rounds at Sidney, Australia, December 26, 1908. He lost the title to Willard at Havana, Cuba, April 16, 1915, in a battle that ever since has been a source of argument. Born at Galveston, Texas, and christened John Arthur Johnson, he began his ring career in 1899 and ended it in 1928. During that time he participated in 109 major fights and exhibitions. His successful defense of the championship against Jim Jeffries at Reno, Nev., July 4, 1910, was the original "Battle of the Century," which was promoted by Tex Rickard and became his springboard to fight promotion fame.

Western Oregon to Get Full Cream Price Boost

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—The Portland OPA district, which covers western Oregon and Washington counties, will get the full price increase on cream authorized throughout the nation, Andrew Trice, district OPA price executive, said yesterday.

He said he was advised from Washington that milk handlers in the area may charge 1 cent more for a half pint of cream with 16 per cent or more butterfat and 2-cent more for "half and half" cream, under 16 per cent butterfat.

The area was granted only half the price increase on milk because of a 1-cent boost received in April.

wrong track—we rejected that." Malone's union is one of the seven united in the wage and hour demands. Although the proposal is addressed to the CIO National Maritime Union with whom eastern operators deal, the unions are standing closely together and know one another's views.

Leaders to Be Quizzed
On the fringe of the case, a House labor subcommittee prepared to meet this afternoon to quiz Harry Bridges and Joe Curran, the powerful CIO maritime leaders.

At the Labor Department, a crew of nearly-exhausted conciliators worked to prevent a tieup by persuading labor and management to accept their plan for distributing extra cash to seamen to compensate for a 56-hour work week at sea.

The night negotiations broke up with no announcement. The strike of seamen and dock workers called by the CIO-dominated committee for maritime unit (CMU) is scheduled to clutch the nation's waterfronts beginning at 12:01 A. M., June 15.

Conway Gives Hope
Conway told reporters last night he believes a settlement is "shaping up" and that the strike will be called off.

His opinion is important because the War Shipping Administration still owns about 80 per cent of the nation's merchant vessels; he had talked earlier with the men who operate them for the government and who are dealing with the unions on hours and wages.

But Conway made it clear that the Labor Department is running the negotiations and he had no authority to announce anything that went on there.

Senator Morse Praises Vetoing of Case Bill

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore.) former member of the War Labor Board and a foe of the Case bill, applauded the president's action in vetoing the bill today.

"The Case bill," he contended, "would cause more—rather than prevent—labor disputes. Many of its provisions were a clear violation of civil and property rights guaranteed by the Constitution."
