Dr. W. Skipworth, Retired Methodist Pastor, Dies

PORTLAND, June 11.—(AP)—Dr. Walton Skipworth, 83, who served 51 years in the Methodist ministry before retiring, died at his home here Sunday.

His first pastorate was at Springfield. He served later in Portland, Bend and Redmond. He was a former trustee of Williamette University. In 1905 he introduced a resolution at the Oregon Methodist conference which resulted in removal of the body of Jason Lee, the missionary, from Canada to Salem.

He was born in Louisiana, and came to Oregon in 1874. His survivors include a brother, Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene.

Where There's Smoke—

KANSAS CITY, June 11.—(AP)—Dense, black smoke enveloped the 14-story Kansas City Club.

A man, baggage in hand, crawled out of a 13th floor window and began scrambling down a fire escape as 400 or 500 spectators on the ground below yelled at him.

The more they yelled the faster he came until he reached the second floor level where their shouts must have become intelligible. For he stopped, gazed despairingly at the steps rising endlessly above him and began his return trip.

They had been trying to tell him the source of the fire—burning tar paper protecting a freshly-laid sidewalk.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 10.—(AP)—Charles Bird, 42, a ranch laborer, died this morning of injuries received last night when he was struck by a car while attempting to cross the Klamath Falls-Reno highway near Tulelake, Calif.

Driver of the car was Gus Titch of Tulelake. California officers said investigation indicated Bird

started across the road, reached the center, and started back back when he was hit.

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
