

Carnival Tonight At Armory to Aid Needy Families

The Roseburg Armory will be transformed into a scene of festive gaiety tonight at 8 o'clock, as the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Ladies Auxiliary-sponsored carnival gets under way.

Complete with sideshow barker, a jitney dance, a dancing contest and a floor show, the public is certain of a full evening of entertainment, according to Mrs. Jane Bissell, chairman of the carnival. Proceeds will go to the Roseburg Recreation program and a fund to help needy families of veterans of the V. F. W. Post #468.

Numerous prizes consisting of scarce merchandise, cash awards, and home-made cakes will be the features of booths and concessions, which include bingo, dart throwing, grab bag, roulette, fish pond, fortune telling, nigger baby baseball alley, penny pitching, tea towel and food booth, popcorn and soft drinks, and a continuous jitney dance featuring Bob Doty's orchestra.

Minor's Work Permits Issued to Students

From 50 to 60 high school students and graduates received temporary minor's work permits from June 3 through June 8 through the United States Employment Service in Roseburg, Frank W. Chase, manager of the local office, reported yesterday.

"There are still plenty of orders for millmen and loggers, but with school out for the summer, a lot of labor shortage was relieved throughout the county," Chase said.

Most applicants came at the local office in the courthouse, represented Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin, Oakland, and Roseburg.

Persons under 18 years of age are required by state law to acquire a minor's work permit by presentation of a birth certificate. They are then judged by the State Labor Board.

Jobs included light mill work, clerks, farm work, and office work for the most part, Chase stated.

Foresters Eye Timber In Improvement Plans

Roseburg visitors yesterday were Charles Rinde, of the division of timber management, and Alexander Jaenicke, in charge of insect and disease control, both from the Portland regional office of the Forest Service.

Rinde and Jaenicke are interested in planting and stand improvement, and yesterday looked over areas of the Umpqua National Forest suitable for stand improvement.

Part of their work, local Forest Service officials said, will be to locate trees needing pruning, inknotted lumber, by having their lower branches cut away.

Ristelsen, president of the selling firm, announced. He said price of the property—more than 40 million feet of timber—exceeded \$100,000.

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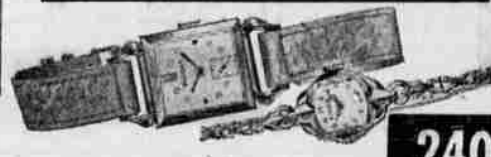
