### Dances Scheduled For Rodeo Week

### Says U. S., Russia Approaching War

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—(AP)—America is already fighting a diplomatic war with Russia, Dr. H. R. Peters declared at the session of the Northwest Institute of International Relations at Reed College last night.

"The people in Europe, millions of them, are waiting for the war to resume—between Russia and the United States," the former

chief of moral operations branch of the Office of Strategic Services asserted.

"I have talked to them. They expect a clash at any moment. War may come without any positive steps by America or Russia. If the present drift in international affairs is permitted to continue we may stumble into war—over affairs in Europe, in the Middle-East, in China," the Reed College professor of German warned.

He said "our preparations for atomic warfare are viewed with great suspicion and misgiving in many parts of the world. No mat-

### Petrillo, Musicians' Czar, Facing Federal Charge

CHICAGO, June 13.—(AP)—James C. Petrillo, president of the AFL American Federation of Musicians, was charged with violation of the Lea law in a criminal information filed in federal court today by U. S. District Attorney J. Albert Woll.

Petrillo, who was accused of calling a strike of three studio

librarians at radio station WAAF in an effort to "coerce, compel and constrain" the station to double the number of such employees, expected prosecution. He said, in calling the strike, he was ready to take a test of the law's constitutionality to the U. S. Supreme Court.

The Lea law, sometimes called the anti-Petrillo law, provides on conviction one year imprisonment or \$1,000 fine or both.
