Terminal Leave Pay for Veterans Still Distant

While the House Tuesday passed the "terminal leave pay" bill and sent it to the Senate, veterans are cautioned not to become prematurely excited over the fact because it may be some time yet before any pay will be available to ex-servicemen for unused furlough or leave time.

This warning came from officials of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, who said reports indicate considerable delay is expected on the measure in the Senate.

Furthermore, should the bill eventually pass the Senate, there is a possibility the President will follow the lead of the Budget Bureau and veto the bill, Veterans' Affairs officials said.

Should the bill finally become law, the Department of Veterans' Affairs will release full details and explain how Oregon veterans can apply for their pay, spokesmen for the department said.

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Chief Forester Watts Brief Roseburg Visitor

Lyle F. Watts, chief of the United States Forest Service, Washington, D. C., paid a flying visit to Roseburg yesterday in a Forest Service plane, accompanied by four officials of the regional office at Portland.

The chief forester stopped here for an hour while on an inspection tour of cut-over and burned-over areas in the Willamette valley and on the coast. He was accompanied by Otto Lindh and Charles Tebbe, assistant regional foresters; Elmer Matson of the Northwest Experiment Station and Larry Solari, chief pilot for the Forest Service.

The party was joined at lunch in the Umpqua hotel by M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

Yesterday's visit was Watts' second to Roseburg. He visited here in 1939, while he was regional forester for Oregon and Washington.

County Health Office Reports 2-Month Work

During April and May, 2,826 inoculations, vaccinations and tuberculin tests were given by the county health office, Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer, announced today.

April inoculations and tests totaled 1,928; diphtheria, 165; smallpox vaccinations, 1,000; typhoid, 127; whooping cough, 24; Schick tests, 333; and tuberculin tests, 279.

May inoculations and tests totaled 824; a group of more than 1,000; diphtheria, 114; smallpox, 220; typhoid, 130; whooping cough, 38; Schick tests, 220; and tuberculin tests, 176.

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
