

Sparring Mate Thinks Louis Will Get Conn Early

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., June 14.—(AP)—Al Hoosman, one of four big, clever Negro fighters who have been helping Joe Louis sharpen his batting eye here for the past 44 days, is convinced that the champion is holding out a few secret weapons to use on Billy Conn next Wednesday night.

"I'm sure Joe's using a little camouflage," was the way the Los Angeles stylist put it. "Just every now and then he shows me enough in there for me to know he isn't doing his best all the time. He's much faster than when we started training, and he can hit plenty sharp when he's a mind to."

There's not a doubt in Hoosman's mind that Louis will catch Conn fairly early, though he admits to a great admiration for Billy after having dropped over to his camp several times to watch him box.

"He's a fine little fighter," he said seriously. "It's too bad he has to fight big men like Joe who hits so much harder than he can. Nobody's going to keep Joe from hitting him. I know."

Louis Easy on Partners
Louis, as though to bear out Hoosman's contention that he has been showing flashes of his best form only in spurts, looked about 50 per cent better yesterday than on Tuesday. He still wasn't trying to sail in and drop his partners, and he even permitted a small smile to play about his mouth at times, but he never left any doubt who was boss.

Hoosman who made Joe look a bit silly at times on Tuesday, was badly shaken by one of the few rights Joe threw in seven rounds. Louis stepped back and made no effort to follow it up. At other times when he found an opening after stalking a sparring mate around the ring he tossed only a sort of token punch, as though he might be saving the real article for Conn.

16th Homer Puts Scarsella at Top Of Circuit Hitters

Scarsella, Oakland first baseman today emerged from a pitcher's worrying sore in the Pacific Coast Baseball League with his 16th blood tinger, a clout that put him ahead of the field of circuit sluggers.

The heavy hitter's game-tying blow in the eighth inning last night helped the Oakland Club to a 3-2 victory over the Sacramento Solons to maintain its two-game margin at the top of the loop. News of 4-H CLUBS

Douglas County pheasant hunters will have approximately 230 more birds to hunt this year if pheasant eggs set by Neil Sheets, Brockway, Keith Lockaby, Lookingglass, and Donald Nickelson, Temmie, hatch out an average of 80 per cent, states Kenneth Minnick, county club agent.

The 4-H Club members set 250 eggs furnished them through the State Game Commission. The young birds will be reared by the boys until they are ten or twelve weeks of age. Then, a representative of the game commission will count the live birds, pay the club members 75 cents for each bird and, if the customary procedure is followed this year as in past, the birds will be liberated in the locality where they were hatched.

The 4-H Club summer school is the main topic of discussion for the 84 club members awarded scholarships to attend this year's 10-day school June 18 to 28. Club members will leave Roseburg Tuesday, June 18, at 10 A. M. in school buses and will return the morning of June 28. During their ten days' stay they will receive instruction in all phases of home economics, arts and crafts work, livestock, fitting, showing and judging. Special

Deadly Botulism Made Harmless if Foods Are Boiled

Botulism poisoning, probably the most dreaded type of food poisoning and which kills from one to three persons a year in Oregon, can be easily and positively eliminated simply by making sure that canned food in which it occurs is boiled 10 minutes before eating as soon as the can or jar is opened.

This is the warning given by G. V. Copson, head of the bacteriology department at Oregon State College, as this year's canning season starts. While botulism has been reported at least once in almost every food, about 90 per cent of all cases have resulted from canned string beans and asparagus used cold in a salad, and in canned corn that was warmed but not boiled, he added.

"The real danger of botulism is that it strikes so seldom that people become careless in preparation of canned food," Copson explained. "Because the deadly bacteria which cause botulism are so abundant in Oregon soil, constant care is needed. Nationally known commercially canned products have never been reported as causing botulism."

It is not safe to depend on odor or off flavor to reveal botulism contamination, the bacteriologist warns. Eating just one string bean that appeared normal caused the death of a woman who sampled a can before cooking the beans for the family, which ate them without injury after they were boiled. Half an olive has also proved fatal.

Following correct, conscientious canning methods is the first step in eliminating death from botulism, and the next is making sure that home canned susceptible foods are boiled 10 minutes as soon as opened and before they are even tasted, he concluded. If leftovers are put away for a few days, it is safest to boil them again.

Water Assn. Head Dies
OGDEN, Utah, June 13.—(AP)—Ora Hundy, 63, president of the National Reclamation Association, died of a heart attack yesterday.

The ex-mayor of Ogden was also chairman of the Utah Department of Publicity and Industrial Commission.

Lynam, Kenaston Bout Will Support Judo Headliners

A couple of ex-army sergeants, one a rough and tough customer and the other a genial but hard-working man, will furnish Douglas County mat followers with semi-final action in Saturday night's wrestling show at the Roseburg Armory.

The principals are Bob Kenaston, Gold Hill, and Joe Lynam, Redmond. While Kenaston was whipping buck privates into soldiers, Lynam was winning the Australian mat championship in between South Pacific invasions. Foot-soldiering will be forgotten, however, when the two matmen tangle here this week.

Lynam, who has been off color in his mat work since dropping his coast junior heavyweight title, hopes to regain his stride against the flat-minded Kenaston. But the rugged lantern-jawed tuckie is a formidable foe and may spoil the popular Redmond athlete's campaign toward a title match.

Achiu-Katonen, Rematched
Although the Lynam-Kenaston bout will furnish plenty of fireworks and dynamic action, the attraction expected to draw an overflow crowd will be the return engagement between Walter Tinkit Achiu and Paavo Katonen.

The skirmish, ordered re-fought by the Roseburg wrestling commission, will give local fans another taste of the exciting Oriental mat sport of judo. The Oriental mat tactics provide fans with virtually legalized mayhem.

By tugging at the judo jackets, the matman is allowed to strangle his head through the ropes in the second fall.
