Error in Report On Loggers Strike Issue Corrected

Ray Lea, Roseburg, member of the CIO International Negotiating Committee, calls attention to an error appearing in an Associated Press news dispatch from Victoria, B. C. June 15, in connection with the report of progress on the strike of CIO woodworkers. The item stated that "Chief Justice Gordon Sloan recommended June 1 a 15-cent-an-hour increase in wages, a 40-hour work week and revocable checkoff system of union dues. The I.W.A. had demanded a 25-cent-an-hour increase in wages, 44-hour week, and union security." "The report that the Union demanded a 44-hour week and that Justice Sloan recommended a 40-hour week is absolutely incorrect, as the Union demanded a 40-hour work week and Justice Sloan recommended a 44-hour week," Lea said. "Our Union," Lea reports, "has always attempted to reduce the hours in the work week and has never requested they be increased. This is one of the big issues over which our British Columbia membership is still on strike and I would like to see our position stated correctly." In previous reports of the British Columbia strike, the issue had been correctly reported in press dispatches, the misstatement June 15 evidently having occurred through clerical or transmission error.

Driver Fined \$500, Draws Jail Term

A reckless driving charge to which he pleaded guilty February 18, brought a sentence of 60 days in the county jail and a fine of \$500 to Robert Earl Fox, 22, last Saturday in the court of Justice of the Peace Hartfield. Fox had been charged with causing damages to the automobile of Ernest O. Davis while driving in an alleged reckless manner on the Pacific Highway near Wilbur last January. After his arrest and plea of guilty in February, Fox was released to Portland police on a felony warrant to face a charge of grand larceny. Hartfield reported. When Portland authorities released Fox, they failed to notify local police, Hartfield said. If Fox pays Davis for damages to his automobile, \$400 of the fine will be suspended, Hartfield said.
