Tornado Leaves 17 Dead, More Than 100 Injured

playthings and bodies of the victims were buffeted as the tornado reached its zenith. The tornado, climaxing two days of violent rainstorms in the area, struck without warning. Scores of residents of populous River Rouge were at their supper tables when it hit.

The Fisher low cost housing project was first to feel the fury of the tornado, which leveled 10 of the 546 units and caused severe damage to others.

At least 15 project residents were injured as the wind ripped buildings as if they were made of paper. Several small fires broke out, adding to the panic.

250 Miles an Hour

The tornado, which Weather Bureau officials said traveled more than 250 miles an hour, tore on through the business district of populous River Rouge, leaving a trail of destruction in its wake.

It then zoomed across the Detroit River, the section of the tornado creating four huge water-spouts. Coast Guardsmen said that as far as they knew, no boats had been damaged by the huge freaks of nature.

The terrifying funnel, estimated variously at from 20 to 100 feet at its base, sucked nearly everything in a 100-yard swath into its fatal grip.

Sandwich West, Sandwich East and the outskirts of Windsor were the Canadian communities which recoiled under the full blast of the tornado before it headed for Lake St. Clair, where the Weather Bureau said it dissipated.

The weatherman said the tornado ran its course in about 10 minutes.

On the American side of the border, all available police, firemen, ambulances, doctors, nurses and Red Cross workers were pressed into service to bring succor to the stricken area.

Detroit hospitals were hard-pressed to handle seemingly endless streams of injured, many of whom were discharged after first aid treatment without their names being recorded.

Tornado's Antics Told

"I've seen them in the west, but never one like that one," declared W. H. Coyle of Windsor, as he commented on the tornado. "It seemed to bounce along and every time the tip of the cone touched the earth there was a rush of smoke. It seemed to pick or suck a house up and ram it to bits, dropping pieces of wood and debris all over the country."

"Outside the cone, it seemed to be dark, which made the cone in the center look something like a flashlight. As it picked up a house, it looked as though there was going to be a fire—and then a terrific wind seemed to smother the fire."

Outruns Automobiles

Mr. and Mrs. Martin Cobb of Carrollton, O., who were nearly trapped by the tornado as they drove to a wedding in River Rouge, gave a graphic account of the disaster.

"It was twisting across open fields like small dusters we often see in Ohio corn fields during the spring. In a second, it seemed to grow in force, picked up loose dirt and assumed a darkish tinge," said Cobb.

"I stepped on the gas to keep clear of it. I saw a huge billboard twisted from the ground and tossed into the air. Next I saw a house top pass overhead."

"When the tornado was about 40 yards behind me, I stepped on the gas and drove to a nearby viaduct where I stopped while the storm passed overhead. Two cars sped past us and right into the tornado. They were smashed into a wall."

Eugene Jones of West Liberty, W. Va., a passenger in the Cobb car said he saw a sedan lifted from the highway and dropped onto the roof of a house which collapsed.

Haystack Futile Refuge

Daniel Puskas of Sandwich West saw the twister coming and herded his wife, Yolanda, and their two small children, Ethel, seven and Daniel, four, towards a pile of hay near the house.

Feverishly he burrowed a hole for the children and his wife, covered them over and then stretched his own body atop the pile. The twister hit.

It was too strong for Puskas to

hold the hay down and the wind swept the haystack away leaving the family on the ground. The children were unhurt.

on the Republican ticket. In the general election he will face Peter M. MacDonald, former state Democratic chairman, who also had no rivals.

Contests in Michigan

Michigan's four-way contest for the Republican gubernatorial nomination and a few congressional district races there and in Massachusetts provided the noteworthy competition in today's voting.

Republican aspirants to the Michigan state house post were Lt. Gov. Vernon J. Brown, Mayor Edward J. Jeffries, Jr., of Detroit, Raymond J. Kelley, former national commander of the American Legion, and Kim Sigler, former special prosecutor for a grand jury which investigated charges of irregularities in state spending.

On the Democratic side former Gov. Murray D. Van Wagoner was opposed by William J. Cody of Detroit.

No senatorial candidate challenged either the Republican incumbent, Arthur H. Vandenberg, or James H. Lee, former Detroit corporation counsel, who will provide his Democratic opposition in November.

Emil Hurja, who changed parties after a stint as executive director of the Democratic National Committee early in the New Deal, tried for a Republican house nomination in the 12th Michigan district.

Walsh, Lodge Unopposed

In Massachusetts none chose to run against Democratic Senator David I. Walsh and former Republican Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., both advancing automatically to their fall contest for Walsh's seat.

The only Republican candidate for governor was Lt. Gov. Robert F. Bradford. Gov. Maurice J. Tobin had taken opposition in the Democratic primary.

In the 11th congressional district a field of 10 sought the Democratic nomination to succeed Rep. James M. Curley, now mayor of Boston. Among them were John F. Kennedy, decorated former P.T. boat commander and son of Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to England; Catherine F. Falvey, ex-captain of the WACS, and John F. Cotter, Curley's secretary.

Four Britons Kidnaped In Holy Land Terrorism

were blindfolded and forced into taxicabs, the informant said. (Reuters reported from Tel Aviv that the British sixth airborne division was scouring the city for the kidnapers and their victims, reported to be fliers.)

(The agency said two British soldiers were seriously wounded in Jerusalem when attackers fired from a passing taxicab.)

Trains Attacked

While the battle of the Haifa rail yards proceeded last night, two unsuccessful attempts were

made to bomb trains and halt them.

Palestine police said the engineer of a train between Haifa and Lydda ignored a red flag waved on the tracks two miles north of Lydda. Shots rattled around the cars but no casualties were sustained.

Other reports said a land mine exploded near Khanyunis, between Gaza and the Egyptian border frontier in the south, just after an oil train passed. Reports said the rails were repaired and service on the Lydda-Kanatarata min line to Egypt was not interrupted.

Latest advices from Haifa said the railway shops and a powerhouse were destroyed last night. A locomotive was ruined. Police continued to cordon off the area of the battle.

The raiders set off 15 explosions in the rail yards and escaped over heavily mined roads.

Bridge Wrecking Probed

Previously the government announced that six Jews were slain Sunday night in attacks during which all of Palestine's frontier bridges were wrecked. A British officer and two British soldiers also died, the officer while dismantling a mine under a bridge and the two soldiers in a clash with Arabs.

The British Army, meanwhile, continued to question the 62 male residents of the village of Beth Haavara, on the Dead Sea, in connection with the wrecking of the bridges. Twelve other men and two women, one of them with a bullet wound in her chest, also were under arrest.

Police dogs led troops to the village, which they entered only after forcibly moving the male residents at bayonet point. The entire population of the village had attempted to bar the troops by linking arms and taking a stand.
