

SANITARIAN NEEDED

The Douglas County budget committee is reported to have rejected an appeal for funds with which to employ a county sanitary engineer.

Few people, we fear, are aware of the great danger and menace to health occasioned by poor sanitation.

Employment of a sanitarian is proposed as a state subsidized project. The state, with federal cooperation, would pay one-third of the cost.

The budget committee, naturally, is concerned with future expenses of a new department.

Our county health department, county agricultural and 4-H club departments are good examples.

If we installed a sanitary engineer we could expect his work to expand and costs to go up in proportion.

We have in Douglas County approximately 500 places dispensing foods and beverages.

We have a sewage disposal problem that deserves immediate attention.

The county health department reports that approximately one-third of the calls received at the local office pertain to unsanitary conditions.

It is true that a sanitarian would cost money, but we believe the service to be rendered would well justify the expenditure.

An effort will be made, at the time the county budget is given a public hearing, to have the item for employment of a sanitarian included.

Order May Boost Lumber for Farms

Farmers may find a ray of hope for more lumber as the result of recent actions taken by the Civilian Production Administration.

Instructions to CPA field offices to cut down two-thirds on the amount of lumber approved for uses other than in housing and farm construction.

25 percent of a distributor's regular monthly supply of lumber must now be held for uses without priority ratings as well as all lumber a distributor may get above his regular certified amounts.

Redwood Firms Make New Offer to Strikers

EUREKA, Calif., June 18.—(AP)—Redwood lumber operators today offered an increase of 20 cents an hour to striking lumber and sawmill workers in a move to break a labor deadlock.

The proposed increase would establish a new minimum of \$1.02 an hour.

In addition, the operators offered further wage increases to skilled workers, immediately upon a return to work; renews an offer of a one-week vacation

to all employees, and two weeks for those with five years' service; agreed to negotiate safety provisions consistent with conditions in each operation; repented a previous offer of maintenance of union membership, but again declined to accept the union shop demand by strikers.
