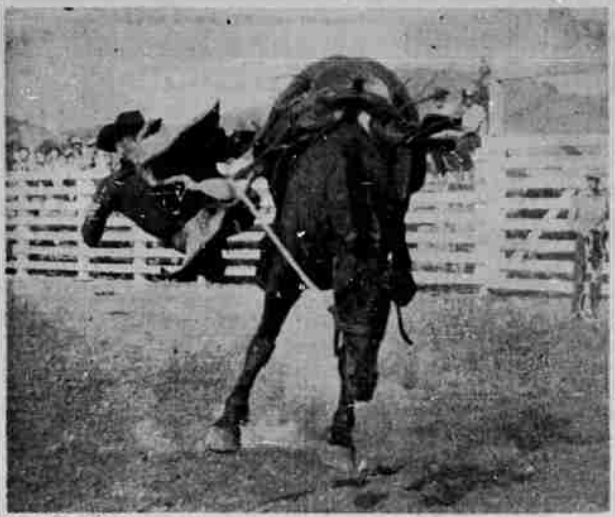

Fast Work Done To Set Broadcast Of Louis-Conn Go

Fight fans of Roseburg and vicinity will hear the blow-by-blow description of the Louis-Conn fight despite the fact that the KRNR staff has been in turmoil during the last 24 hours when it appeared previous arrangements might break down, Marshall Pengra, station manager, reported today.

New clearance and technical details, however, were arranged to assure the broadcast as scheduled.

Connected with the work of clearing the airlines for presentation of the fight report was the necessity for obtaining permission from the American Broadcasting Company to connect to its lines, three long distance conversations with agents in Hollywood and one call to New York being made. Hiring and arranging telephone lines took additional long distance calls, and brought four business firms, Douglas County Flour Mills, Roseburg Lumber Company, California Oregon Power Company, and Youngs Bay Lumber Company into the picture for help in paying the cost of wire tolls.

It then became necessary to secure permission from Hollywood to transcribe the Gabriel Heatter program for later release, more calls to Marshfield and Grants Pass to arrange a "feed" of the fight to stations in those towns; rescheduling of local sponsors—Roseburg Pharmacy, Wilder's, Clark's Studio, Ward's, Miller's, Hansen Motor Tire Dept., and Roseburg Motor Company, and two network programs, Kremlin and Coca-Cola, all of which have given up their scheduled time to permit the fight to be broadcast.

"Trouble? Not in the least! Glad to do it, and so were the sponsors who cooperated so generously," said Pengra.

Pan-American Clipper Makes Pancake Landing

WILLIMANTIC, Conn., June 19.—(AP)—Forty-two passengers, including actors Laurence Olivier and his wife, Vivien Leigh, were winging their way to England today aboard a Pan-American Clipper of the Constellation type after surviving a pancake landing at a tiny airport here.

The Transatlantic plane in which they left La Guardia Field, New York, at 1 P. M., yesterday developed engine trouble a few miles east of here, forcing it to come into Windham Field, an airport designed only for much smaller craft, on three engines and with the wheels retracted.

The fourth engine fell in a field on a farm in Canterbury, about 100 feet from a highway, and did no damage.
