

Battle Royal of 5 Grapplers Will Top Next Program

Wrestling Matchmaker Don Owen will continue his policy of giving "red hot" Roseburg the best available mat talent in the Pacific Northwest by booking a torrid five-man "battle royal" as the headline attraction of the weekly show at the Armory arena Saturday night.

Personnel of the free-for-all will be: Georges Dusette, popular French-Canadian and new holder of the Pacific Coast junior heavyweight championship.

Billy McEun, Southwestern light-heavyweight titleholder.

Joe Lynam, former Australian champion.

Mike Nazarian, uncrowned champion of villains.

Jack Popenheimer, Dutch grappler from Portland.

Dusette, following his victory over Bruno Angelo at Klamath Falls last week in winning the coast crown, looms as the favorite to walk away with the attractive \$300 purse offered by Owen.

There will be a premium on winning because the runnerup will collect only \$75 and the other three men eliminated will collect little more than expenses.

First man ousted will be eliminated and his stipend will be expense money. The next two men pinned to the mat or kayoed will

return for a 30-minute match in which the winner collects \$55 and expenses and the loser nothing but "coffee and doughnut" money.

The two finalists also engage in a 30-minute skirmish for the coveted \$300 purse.

Although Lynam was held to a draw by Bob Kenaston here last week, many Douglas County fans are picking Joe to wade through all opposition in the battle royal.

Starting time of this week's show will be set up a half hour to 8 P. M. to allow the Sheriff's Posse dance to be held in the Armory the same evening.

NEW YORK, June 19.—(AP)—After his last drill with the champ at Pompton Lakes, N. J., Al Hoosman, a pretty good and pretty fast heavyweight who served as one of Joe Louis' sparring partners, remarked: "No matter how long I fight, I'll always say I've been hit by Louis for the last time." Tonight Billy Conn may be saying the same thing. Just as Ray Robinson predicted a couple of weeks ago, Louis suddenly found his timing was right in the last few workouts and his straight left almost jolted his sparmates heads off their shoulders.

The odds favoring Louis in tonight's tussle are approximately the same as they were for the Louis-Lou Nova affair in 1941.

Annapolis Naval Academy Negro Is Facing 6 Charges

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 19.—(AP)—The prosecution continued yesterday to develop its case against Chief Steward Walter W. Rollins, Negro, after the press was excluded from the general court martial proceedings the day before for the second time.

The Naval academy steward faces six charges, including that of adultery with a white woman and an unnamed morals court.

James R. Burts, a cook third class, was the witness heard in closed session. Court officials said his testimony concerned statements made to him by Curtis Carter, a steward's mate first class, who previously had testified in closed court in connection with the sex charges against Rollins.

Rollins has entered a plea of innocent to charges of adultery,

the morale offense, theft, gambling, embezzlement and misconduct. An investigation of an all-night party in Rollins' room at the North Severn officers' mess last Feb. 10 resulted in the charges against the chief steward.

Testimony that he had seen 23-year-old Mrs. Margaret A. Sima in the room of the defendant was given by Aaron Wilson, Negro, a steward's mate first class who served under Rollins at the officers' mess.

Earlier, Mrs. Sima said she never had been in Rollins' quarters except in the presence of her husband and others. She is the blonde wife of Musician First Class William R. Sima, Jr., Naval Academy bandman.

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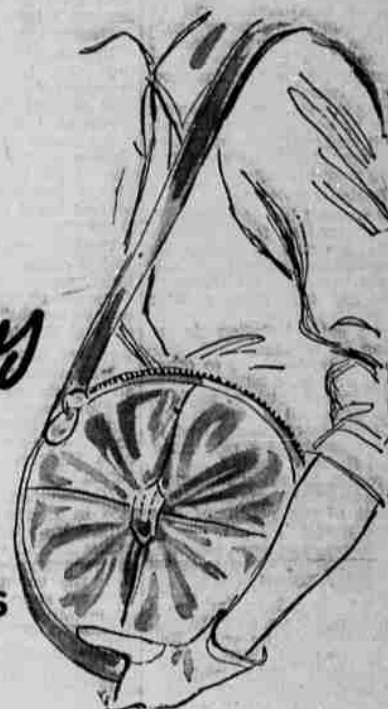
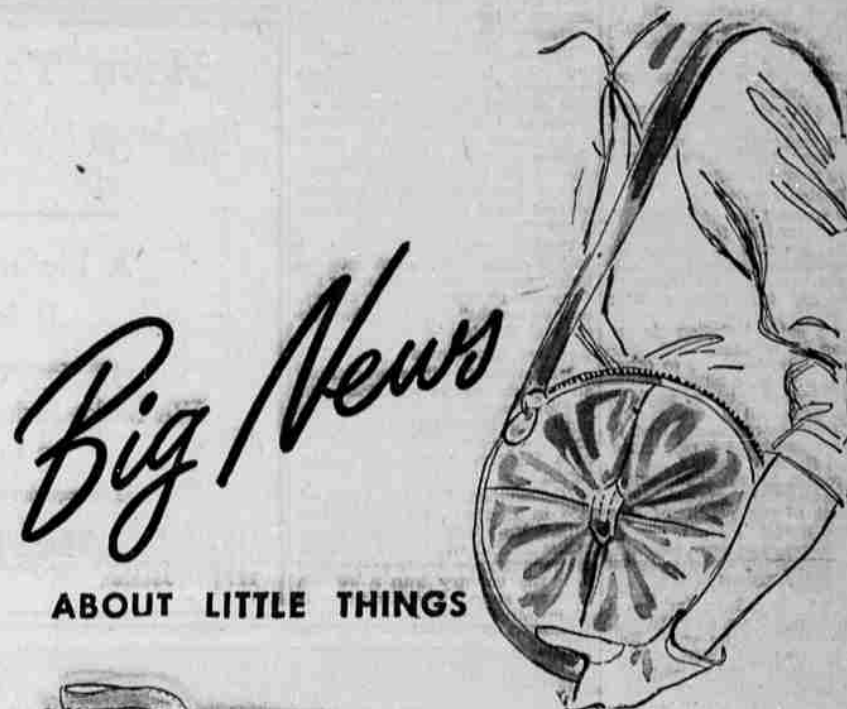
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
