In no event, however, would youths of 18 be inducted before October 1, and then only if President Truman certified they are needed. Their duty would be restricted to the continental United States until they are 19.

as it was after the last war. "But if price controls are weakened or destroyed, the old charges of profiteering will be echoing around the country again during the next few months. I know that this is a matter of deep concern to every forward-looking business leader."

"During the war years, the vast majority of businessmen through unselfish and willing cooperation in the war effort achieved tremendous new prestige. Small Business Periled

"Only a small handful are willing to jeopardize that prestige and the nation's economy by throwing price and rent controls overboard now in an attempt to reap quicker and even greater profits."

Wallace said inflation is as damaging to business, and especially small business, as to other economic groups, adding:

"With prices rising rapidly, millions of small business men will come out second best in the wild scramble for raw materials and finished goods."

The result, he asserted, would be to "encourage monopoly with prices out of the reach of the American people."

Sixth British Officer Kidnaped in Palestine

cl passed a resolution at an emergency meeting calling on the kidnapers to release the British captives immediately. Mayor Israel Rokach asserted he did not believe the officers were in the city.

Bees Used in Resistance

Residents of the Jewish settlement near Acre resisted a military search of the area yesterday, blocking gates to the town with an iron water tank and releasing a hive of bees, an army spokesman said.

Entering the area after removing the blocks, the soldiers searched the town, detained several persons for questioning and confiscated signalling apparatus.

All roads through the inner Galilee section of Palestine in the north were blocked. Telephone lines were cut to prevent alarms being spread to other settlements.

British engineers threw a bridge across the Jordan between Palestine and Syria, replacing the dynamited "Bride of the Daughters of Jacob" which raiders destroyed Sunday.

Barriers Proclaimed

Military authorities proclaimed all Jewish premises in Palestine out of bounds to British troops until the kidnaped officers are freed. The prohibition applied to bars, theaters, hotels and restaurants.

(Spokesmen for the Arab office in London said "the latest outbreak of terrorism by Zionist gangs in Palestine is a strange commentary on Jewish claims to turn the country into a Jewish national state. These outbreaks of criminal violence only serve

to emphasize the justice of the Arab cause.

"Although one accepts that these periodic outrages are committed by extremist elements, failure by the Jewish agency to suppress the activities of such illegal organizations is scarcely likely to commend the Zionist cause to statesmen now concerned with the future of Palestine."

Canned Vegetables and Fruits to Rise in Price

creases "will remain generally unchanged."

In addition to offsetting wage increases, fruit packers will be permitted to raise their prices to compensate for a half cent a pound hike in sugar costs which went into effect last February. Another sugar price increase of a fifth of a cent a pound is pending.

Subsidies May Go

OPA said, too, that if subsidies

are eliminated on canned corn, peas, tomatoes and tomato products, retail prices will be raised by the amount of the subsidy. Price control bills approved by the House and Senate call for a slash in subsidies.

On canned peas, for example, the subsidy amounts to 20 cents a dozen cans. An OPA official estimated that without the subsidy, retail prices for peas would go up 1 to 2 cents a can.

On canned vegetables, OPA provided a pricing formula, effective June 24, which takes into consideration approved wage increases. Individual firms will use this for calculating ceilings on corn, peas, asparagus, tomatoes, lima beans, blackeye peas, mushrooms, catsup, chili sauce, tomato purees, tomato juice and tomato sauce.

OPA said it will be unable to provide a formula for figuring ceilings on canned fruits until growers' prices have been set by the agriculture department.

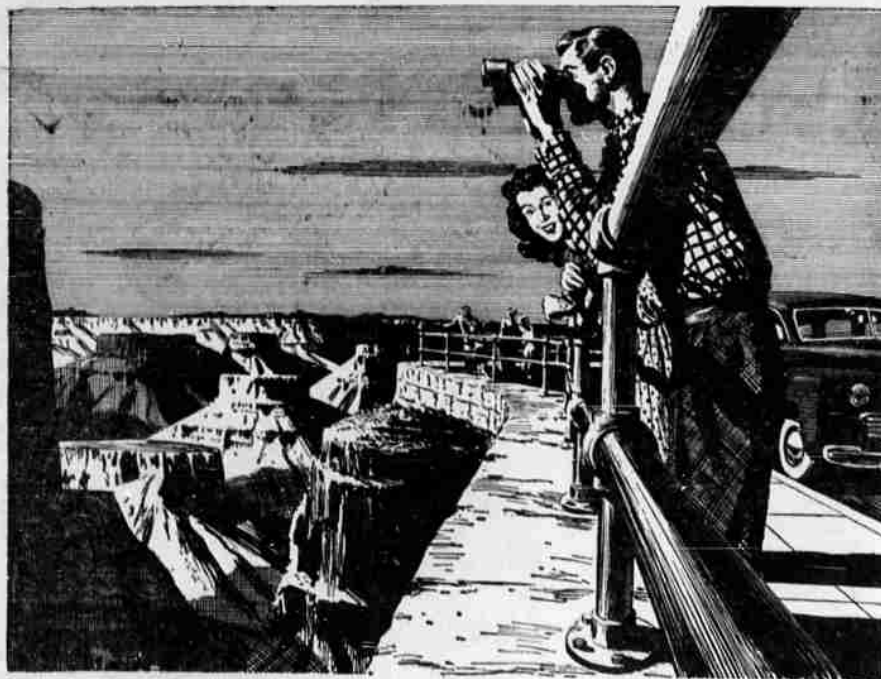

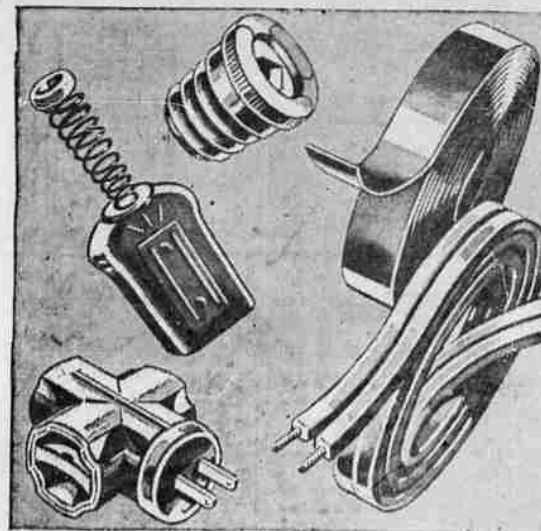

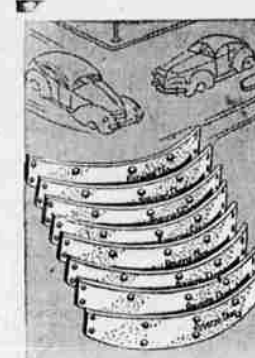
