

All-Star Softball Team Here to Play Visiting Clubs

In order to provide local softball fans with an adequate summer athletic program, a Roseburg Recreation all-star team, composed of players from the five city league teams will be formed this weekend and play visiting games from all over the state, H. W. Gray, recreational director announced today.

Games will be played on evenings which will not conflict with the present softball league games and will include outstanding teams from Portland, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, and other parts of the state.

Managers of the local league teams are cooperating to the fullest extent, Gray said, and by pooling all the outstanding players of the present league, a ball club fully qualified to represent Roseburg and Douglas County can be had without disrupting the present league teams.

Managing the all-star team will be Mel Ingram and Paul Morgan, who will make the all-star selections. Arrangements are being made for play to begin within the next week, Gray reported. Ninety per cent of these games will be played at home.

Junior Legion Nine Still in Making

With only one practice remaining before the Roseburg-Myrtle Creek Junior Legion nine meets the Sutherlin-Oakland aggregation in their first game of the season, Coach Mel Ingram has yet to hit upon a permanent combination of baseballers to send on the field Saturday at 12 P. M. at the Roseburg ball diamond.

Considered in earlier workouts as a good fielding club, but weak in hitting, Ingram classed them as "a pretty fair looking team" at their Monday evening practice.

Outstanding in recent practice workouts has been Davidson, of Myrtle Creek, hurler, who led his 1945 high school nine to the "B" League playoffs in Portland where opponents only scored four hits off him. Other pitchers who show great possibilities are Richardson and Landers, the latter who can ably handle first base as well as pitcher.

Other stalwarts at recent practices are Marsters as catcher; Pope, second base; Evans, third; Clayton of Myrtle Creek, shortstop; Coen and Reinbold, outfielders.

The Friday night practice will determine starting positions for Saturday's game, Ingram said, and new uniforms, donated by Lockwood Motor Company, will be issued.

Douglas to Have Three Legion Junior Teams

Douglas County will be represented this year by three Junior Legion baseball nines, the county winner of which may draw players of their choice from the two opposing nines for competition in the district playoffs.

American Junior Legion baseball, temporarily canceled during the war years in this vicinity, is being resumed by nines composed of players from Drain and Yoncalla, Sutherlin and Oakland, and a third nine of Roseburg and Myrtle Creek youngsters. Boys born after the year 1928 are eligible to compete.

Carol Drake tells how to conserve on bread

The Famine Emergency Committee has asked Americans to cooperate during the present food emergency to conserve bread so that starving people in other lands may be fed. We offer in the following suggestions ways to save precious bread.

TO KEEP YOUR BREAD FRESH—Open the wrapper at one end of the loaf only. Remove the heel, take out only the slices needed, replace the heel, and fold over waxed paper.

TO FRESHEN DRY BREAD—If your bread becomes slightly dry, sprinkle the wrapper around the bread with water or put the bread in a paper sack and sprinkle. Place in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 10 minutes or until bread is heated through. Serve immediately for a homemade-bread flavor.

WHEN YOU HAVE LEFTOVER BREAD—Don't throw it away. Use it in one of the following ways to augment your regular bread supply.

Melba Toast—Use leftover sliced bread. Place on a baking sheet in a single layer and dry out in slow oven (250° F.) about 1 1/2 hours or until a tempting tawny brown. Store in an airtight container and use as needed. Use in place of bread for breakfast, lunch, dinner or as a snack.

Note: Slice leftover hard rolls and use in the same way.

Bread Crumbs—Dry out but do not brown leftover bread, trimmings, crusts, and heels in slow oven (350° F.) for about 15 minutes or use already dry bread. Then roll, crush or grind into fine crumbs. Store in airtight container and use as needed. Use crumbs for scalloped dishes, for coating food, in puddings, or substitute for half the flour in waffle, pancake, muffin or other quick bread recipes.
