

Record Peacetime Budget Sent to House Floor

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(AP)—A \$7,091,034,700 Army budget—biggest ever in peacetime and with an extra \$175,000,000 tossed

in for atomic energy development—went to the House floor today.

It was almost twice as large as the last pre-war allotment, voted in 1941.

Both Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Army chief of staff, and Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, who heads the Manhattan atomic bomb project, cautioned against sharing the A-bomb secret at this time.

Government Will Buy Barley for Western Feed

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department announced yesterday it will buy upwards of 2,000,000 bushels of barley for relief of livestock and poultry feeders in the Northwest and west coast.

Officials said the bulk of the barley will be obtained from malt makers having more than they need until the now crop is harvested.

The government will ship the barley to shortage areas and sell it to farmers needing grain. Officials said that in the case of malt barley, the government will sell the grain at the feed barley ceiling price which is 15 cents a bushel below the ceiling price of malt barley.

New Speed Record Set

DAYTON, Ohio, June 20.—(AP)—The U. S. Army's partly jet-propelled XA-28F flying round-trip between Wright Field and St. Louis set a new speed record of 413 miles per hour today over a 1,000 kilometer course with a 1,000 kilogram payload.

O'Toole demanded later today the New York State Boxing Commission hold up the purses of Louis and Conn until an investigation can be made of last night's championship fight.

On April 10, 1946, the Eugene-Drain line was energized but the Douglas county system was not connected until April 19. Numerous tests showed insufficient energy to supply both the city of Drain and the cooperative's distribution lines, whereupon the cooperative disconnected its lines and did not connect again until June 11. The supply now is sufficient to carry only the existing load.

May Delay Progress

"Unless settlement of differences is obtained and reorganization completed quickly, the current construction program of the cooperative will be set back several months."

At the present time, Cordray said, the cooperative has no standby service to maintain or operate the system or even repair breakdowns.

Various plans to complete early reorganization and restoration of management are under consideration, Cordray said.

This became known today as the National Housing Agency ordered into effect a multi-million-dollar subsidy program for softwood plywood, designed to open up that major bottleneck in home construction.

Manufacturers will be authorized to pay \$7.50 per 1,000 feet more for "peeler" logs, the kind needed for plywood, and to get full reimbursement from the government if they boost production 25 per cent or more above normal quotas.

That regulation was signed as a quick followup to the subsidy of \$5 a thousand for bricks and structural tiles produced in excess of quotas. Both subsidies are part of the \$400,000,000 "premium payment" plan approved by Congress to stimulate output of building materials.
