

Mrs. Anna Gulden Dies in Portland

Mrs. Edward (Anna) Gulden, 71, died in Portland Sunday, following a recent heart attack, according to information received in Roseburg by her niece, Mrs. Fred Lockwood. She was born August 12, 1874, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Jones, who first made their home in Melrose on land now owned by the Busenbark family, and later operated a hotel in Roseburg. She spent a part of her life in California and for a number of years resided in Roseburg, at which time she was employed by the Roy Bellows dry goods store and later by the J. C. Penny Company. For the last year and a half, she has made her home in Portland, where Mr. Gulden had been engaged in work as an electrician in the shipyards. She was a member of the Rebekah Lodge and the Christian Science Church.

Sisters and brothers surviving include: Mrs. C. F. Harpster, Eugene; Mrs. F. H. Vincell, Astoria; Wayne Jones, New Orleans, La.; Sanford Jones, Portland; and William Jones, San Francisco, besides a large number of nephews and nieces.

Funeral services will be held at the Little Chapel of the Chimes in Portland, Wednesday, June 26, at 3 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lockwood of Roseburg will leave Tuesday night for Portland to remain over for the funeral.

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Coalition Cabinet Formed in France

PARIS, June 24.—(AP)—France's third post-liberation coalition government was organized today by President Georges Bidault with eight ministers of his own party, the Popular Republican movement (MRP), seven Communists and six Socialists.

Bidault—who kept the foreign affairs portfolio, handed him by Gen. Charles De Gaulle a year and a half ago—staked his future and that of his party on a cabinet formed only after sizable concessions by the Communists, who retracted their former insistence on demands that trade union demands for 25 per cent wage increases be met.

"They agreed to Bidault's ceiling of 15 per cent salary boosts for low-wage brackets and a suggestion for a worker-employer-government conference to study the whole problem of wages and prices."

Bar Would Intervene in U. S. Judges-OPA Suit

PORTLAND, June 24.—(AP)—The Oregon State Bar today asked the Ninth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco for permission to intervene in behalf of two Oregon federal district judges named in a writ of mandamus suit filed by the OPA.

The OPA suit seeks to compel Judges James Alger Fee and Claude McCollough and clerk of the court Lowell Mundorff to permit OPA attorneys to file suits without the U. S. district attorney participating.

Will H. Masters, Portland attorney and a member of the Oregon State Bar Governors, said the group was interested in preserving the court rules by which the federal judges retain the right to say who shall practice before them. He explained that unless the rules stand as is, the court has no control over the qualifications of attorneys.

Nippon Peer Advocates All-Women Government

TOKYO, June 24.—(AP)—Jinjiro Mizuno, a member of the house of peers, advocated petticoat rule for Japan today, declaring all Japanese males were responsible for the war and should get out of politics.

After proposing that everybody resign in favor of the women, Mizuno turned in the house of peers and asked Premier Yoshida: "What is the attitude of the government on this problem?"

Yoshida, presiding as he does over a strictly male cabinet, refused to be pinned down. He replied that the government was studying ways to better the women's position.

Propeller of Atom Bomb Plane Kills Air Officer

FORT BLISS, Tex.—(Special)—First Lieut. Clarence F. Craw, who was employed with the Roseburg News-Review and KRNR in

House members take the attitude there is no need to single out specific commodities for special treatment, in view of the decontrol policy already agreed upon. In general, this policy calls for removal of ceilings as soon as the supply of a commodity exceeds or balances the demand for it.

The House members cite the Taft-Wolcott amendment as an argument why specific decontrols are not needed. That amendment, approved by the conference, declares that ceilings must reflect to producers, manufacturers and processors their 1941 prices plus average increases in unit costs since then. At least the same dollar increase in ceilings would have to be passed on to distributors and sellers of the product.

Wolcott said if the decontrol problem is settled tonight, the other points at issue can be cleared away in a few minutes.

Subsidies' End Demanded

The House voted a nine months extension of price control and the Senate raised it to a year. It appeared to be a toss-up which period would prevail.

The House called for an end of the \$715,000,000-a-year meat subsidies on June 30, with other food subsidies to go Dec. 31. The Senate was willing to pay them until next May 1.

The Senate approved establishment of a decontrol board, independent of OPA, which could overrule the price administrator (or the Secretary of Agriculture, in the case of farm commodities) for failure to remove ceilings from specific items. This provision, of course, stands or falls on the decision on specific decontrols.

Other performers included the Bus Carson troupe, Hollywood, Calif.; Edith Happy, Lewiston, Ida.; and Buck Abbott, Seattle, Wash., trick riders; Bill Markley, Eugene, clown.

Rodeo stock contractors were the Christensen Bros. of Eugene.

Buildings, Roads Damaged

Russians Are Tardy

Of the Russians, Eisenhower said that in planning for the final spring drive last year it was recognized that its success hinged to a large degree upon the weight of the Red army's pressure in the east, and he noted:

"Up to the end of 1944 I had received no information on matters affecting Russian grand strategy, although I had expressed my willingness to afford any such information concerning my own over-all plans as the Red army might desire."

"At Christmas time, however, following upon a message which I sent to the combined chiefs of staff explaining the difficulty with which I was faced in attempting to evolve plans while still ignorant of the Russian intentions, President Roosevelt secured from Marshal Stalin his agreement to receive our representative in order to discuss the correlation of our respective efforts in the forthcoming spring."

Air Aide Acknowledged

Accordingly Eisenhower's deputy, Air Chief Marshal Tedder, and others of his staff received from Stalin in January a "full explanation" of the plans for a four-pronged offensive by 150 to 160 Red army divisions.

Its success proved "even greater than had been anticipated," Eisenhower wrote.

His chronicle detailed air and naval as well as ground operations, and he acknowledged that "without the overwhelming mastery of the air... our assault against the continent would have been a most hazardous, if not impossible undertaking."

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organ, the United States intends to produce and store atomic bombs.

"Afterwards the United States intends by degrees—'by successive stages'—to share with the international control organ information about the production of atomic energy and permit it to spread its control."

The newspaper asks why the United States, if it announces that the production of atomic weapons will be forbidden, "wants to continue to make and store atomic bombs?"

"On what basis does she pretend to stretch her monopoly in the realm of production of atomic energy to an indefinite period?" the article continued.

"Why are all other countries obligated to show blind trust toward the intentions of the United States as the same time that the United States shows clear expressions of distrust not only toward her partners, but also toward the international control organ?"

"Doesn't Washington understand that the main source of

distrust toward the United States is the noise raised over the forthcoming tests of atomic bombs in the Pacific Ocean?"

These were some of the questions Pravda raised in its argument asserting the superiority of the Soviet plan over the American plan.
