(Continued from page 1) come set in ruts from which they can not climb out is doomed to failure.

BY and large, our constitution has stood the test of time in a remarkable manner. It is all the more remarkable when we consider the fact that more or less ALL new laws are motivated by selfish interest.

That is a broad statement, but those who are familiar with the congress of the United States and the legislatures of the individual states will not challenge it too hotly.

New laws originate in a surprisingly large number of instances because groups of people want special consideration at the hands of the law—OR want to change a law that gives some other group special consideration.

Without the urge of some such interest, a very large proportion of the bills that are enacted into law by congress and the state legislatures would never be initiated.

IT is probable that we shall never change this situation materially. It is improbable that ANY democracy will ever change it materially. Human nature is human nature, and the desire to get a law or a ruling that will help you and your kind is rooted very deeply in it.

But it is a pity that for a WHILE at least we can't declare a moratorium on special interest laws and legislate exclusively for the greatest good of the greatest number, regardless of group or class distinctions and desires.

JUST offhand, of course, that sounds like idealistic tommyrot—something like the statement that the principle of the Golden Rule, if generally followed, would PAY OUT in a big way. But it is substantially true, nevertheless.

What is good for ALL of us is pretty apt to be good in the long run for ANY of us.

THERE is another peculiarity about lawmaking. We like to legislate about things that are apt to be harmful to the OTHER FELLOW.

Gambling is an example. Except in Nevada, laws against gambling are rather general. But there is hardly a town in America—or anywhere else in the world, for that matter—where gambling isn't done from time to time by people who are otherwise quite law-abiding.

CALIFORNIA has a gambling problem at the moment. Wicked persons are fitting up a ship to be anchored offshore where people may come to take a change with Lady Luck. The authorities announce that they are determined to stop it but they don't know just how.

Governor Warren has an interesting idea. He suggests that persons returning by water taxi from the gambling ship (the S. S. Lux) might be placed under quarantine and forced to submit to examinations to determine if they were carrying any communicable disease.

One has a pious idea that blood tests would prove that they are all afflicted with gambling fever, which is highly communicable.

FLOORS, NOT CEILINGS

We've been looking at OPA ceilings so long we're getting a chronic pain in the neck. Personally, we would like to see less attention paid to ceilings and some work done on foundations and floors for a change.

Our present system of price controls, we believe, is leading directly into a period of inflation, which could be materially lessened in duration through a complete reversal of policy.

It may seem a crazy idea to suggest that prices and profits be permitted to run rampant—that profits be assured instead of being discouraged, as at present—but if we are to avoid inflation we must have production, and we can secure production only by encouraging profits.

Present OPA tactics (regardless of what propagandists may say) is to discourage profits. These policies are designated by the term "price control." But the OPA is not concerned with prices—its chief concern is profits. It endeavors to keep producers, manufacturers, retailers—business and industry in general—at the lowest possible profit level.

When forced into adjustments it usually succeeds only in upsetting balances so that all segments of production are affected.

What would happen, on the other hand, if instead of placing a ceiling over prices we put a floor under them? We are at present facing serious food shortages. Food is critically needed in famine-stricken lands. Yet our farm production is being curtailed by feed limitation, unrealistic pricing on livestock, and general OPA blundering.

But suppose farmers were assured cost of production, plus a fair margin of profits on all vital foodstuffs. It is quite obvious that as quickly as the cycle of planting and harvesting could be completed, providing weather conditions were not abnormal, we would have a surplus rather than a shortage of food.

We are desperately short of sugar, yet sugar beet producers of the Pacific Northwest now have representatives in Washington trying earnestly, with but little success, to get some assurance that can profitably plant and market next year's crop.

Our clothing shortage is critical, particularly as it concerns garments in the lower price range. But manufacturers claim OPA pricing prevents them from making the clothing so much in demand. If the manufacturer should be guaranteed a profit for a designated period of time, regardless of market conditions, it would not take long, we predict, to glut our clothing stores with merchandise.

The automobile industry furnishes a good example of OPA tactics, production having been delayed for months, despite a crying need for transportation, because the Washington economists couldn't decide upon prices to be permitted manufacturers.

If we should guarantee profits to the producers and manufacturer—a guarantee of government-supported, profit-taking prices—it would not take long, we predict, to flood markets with consumer goods.

But immediately there arises the question: What about retail prices? If everyone is permitted to take a profit, wouldn't prices skyrocket into uncontrolled inflation?

Such reaction is not at all probable. Inflation cannot exist in the face of ample production. The buying public, aware that needed goods were returning to the market in quantity, would not be nearly as anxious to buy up everything in sight as at present. Prices would adjust themselves within a short period of time, governed entirely by the rate of production, to a fair margin of profit all along the line. Competition would be the controlling factor.

Another question enters into such a program: How could profits be guaranteed? The answer is obvious—subsidies. We are paying subsidies to keep prices high and profits down. Why not pay them to keep profits up and prices down?

Under our present system we can go on paying subsidies forever without any permanent improvement in conditions. But in using subsidies to sustain profits through the period of reconversion, we can see an early end to the subsidy system, through restoration of the natural law of supply and demand.

To those who throw up both hands in holy horror at the thought of permitting the sin of profit-taking, it might be pointed out that income and excess profits tax laws automatically take care of that situation.

It might be an interesting experience to get back to a normal position with our feet on something solid, instead of being suspended topsy-turvy from OPA ceilings.

Postal Receipts Boosted; Former Workers to Return

The growth of Roseburg and surrounding vicinities is shown by an increase of postal receipts, as reported by Postmaster Lester Wimberly of Roseburg, of five per cent over last year, ending June 30, 1946, receipts from postage alone will be more than \$90,000. Receipts for the year of 1945 were \$87,000.

In July the local post office is expected to have its original staff of armed forces members back on duty. These are Norman Hess, Mildred C. Doyle, Paul McGowan and Walter Roser.

McGowan, who was the last carrier to leave for the service, is expected to return to duty in July. Doyle and McGowan both worked with the U. S. Naval fleet post office in San Francisco. Hess, now back in employment, served as a pharmacist's mate in the Southwest Pacific theater, with the U. S. Navy, and was decorated for bravery during his Pacific tour of duty. Roser served with the Army postal service in the United States and later on Okinawa.

Doyle and Roser, substitutes at the local post office upon entering the service, were promoted to regulars when reassigned upon return, due to the expansion of the local department in Roseburg. Hess was promoted to a regular clerk upon retirement of Miss Martha Peery.

New carrier contracts will go into effect July 1 on several routes, Wimberly said. The Camas Valley route will be carried by Mrs. Mildred Hofer. The Look-Ingliss route, which has been extended to include numerous pioneer residences around Tenmile, will be carried by Carl Coleman. The Eugene star route will be carried by Willie H. Scofield and the Melrose route will be carried by D. A. Stewart, who also handles the Ideyld route.

Nation to Learn About Oregon's Turkey Breeders

The progress and accomplishments of the Oregon turkey breeding industry will be featured at the National Turkey Federation convention in St. Louis the last week of July through a booth being prepared by the Oregon Turkey Improvement Association.

Display materials for this booth are being assembled by Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman at O. S. C., who will be one of a delegation of 20 to 25 persons from Oregon attending the convention. Included in materials will be an illustrated folder containing a complete list of breeders in the Oregon improvement program.

Featured in the displays will be facts concerning Oregon's U. S. broad breasted approved and U. S. pullover clean breeding stock. This year more than 400,000 breeder hens were tested in Oregon with all getting the official "Pullover Clean" rating which now applies to all flocks in the program. So far as known no other state has made such a record.
