Poultry-Egg Scarcity In Oregon Predicted

PORTLAND, June 26.—(P)—Chickens and eggs will be scarce in Oregon for two years because of the feed supply problem, a Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers' Association spokesman predicted today.

G. C. Keeney, cooperative manager, said 25 to 30 per cent of the state's laying hens were slaughtered during the fed crisis which Keeney blamed on government mishandling of the grain supply.

A 10-year setback in poultry experiments to improve flocks and egg-producing strains was predicted by Harry M. Brown, head of the Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock Association.

Bread Saving Urged to Feed Hungry Overseas

"If each of us saves two slices of bread daily, 20 million unfortunate abroad will be provided for, it is calculated by the National Famine Emergency Committee," Mrs. Jack Maris, executive secretary of the Douglas County Chapter of the American Red Cross, said today.

The local chapter is prepared to help in the conservation of food in various community programs, Mrs. Maris said.

Mrs. George E. Houck has been named chairman of the nutrition program of the Douglas County Chapter, Mrs. Maris announced, and early in September will direct a series of classes in nutrition. "Feeding Babies and Their Families" will be emphasized.

Registration for the classes will be at the Red Cross office in the Roseburg Armory.

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
