## Liberated Pacific Islands Still Awaiting Decisions on How They Will Be Governed

WASHINGTON—Decision on how the several hundred populated and liberated islands of the Pacific are to be governed is getting nowhere fast.

They are now administered by the Office of Island Government in the Navy Department, Capt. W. F. Jennings commanding. Under Capt. Jennings are some 300 Naval government officers and 500 enlisted men. Navy hopes to cut this number down by more than half.

U. S. Commercial Company—an R. F. C. subsidiary—is trying to nurse the islands back to economic health, but it's a slow process.

Since shortly after the end of the war, the Navy has been making statements as to which of the liberated islands it wanted for permanent bases. Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Mapure, Saipan, Tinian, Manus and Palau. Plus, of course, old bases at Samoa, Midway and Guam. Navy's war time investments in those bases is close to a billion dollars. They range from five million on Majuro to \$275 million on Guam.

The Navy is now in the process of turning over to the Army control over the Ryukus, Okinawa and the Bonins are already under Gen. MacArthur. But aside from the War Department refuses to give any indication of what bases it considers necessary for ground and air security in the western Pacific.

## No Decision Made

Last October the President named a special cabinet committee to report on what U. S. policy should be for administration of the islands. On the committee were the Secretaries of State, War, Navy and Interior. So far, nothing has come out.

On January 15 the President was asked at a press conference if these Japanese mandated islands would be retained by the U. S. His reply was that those islands not needed by the U. S. would be under United Nations trusteeship. For those islands needed by the U. S., request would be made to the U. N. for authority to establish American trusteeship. But no decision had been made on what islands were needed.

In the meantime, two bills on

rights. In effect this would put the Secretary of Interior above both the President and the Secretary of State.

The House Committee on Insular Affairs, after considering both these measures, has decided to take no action before the coming congressional recess. In the next session, however, Congress will have to act. Years ago it was decided the Philippines would be directed towards independence and Hawaii towards statehood. Both policies are being carried out.

But no such decision was ever made on Puerto Rico, Guam and Samoa. The hard times and political turmoil those islands have been through are a sorry reflection on this lack of decision.

In a recent speech in which he blasted the daylight of the Navy's pre-war government on Samoa and Guam, Harold Ickes declared the presidential committee had never met, up to the time

his resignation as secretary of interior was accepted on February 15.

While it may be literally true that the four secretaries never met, it is known that there have been conferences on this subject of island government at lower and more expert levels. State, War and Navy were apparently able to agree, but Interior dissented. That may or may not let out of the bag the catty deduction that Ickes thought all island government should be in Interior, but nobody else agreed.

The hope of this stalemate now lies in the fact that there is a new secretary of interior on the job. Incidentally he is an ex-Navy officer, Commander J. A. Krug. If he goes to the Philippines for the Independence celebration on July 4, he might get a first hand look at some of these islands and come back with ideas for some agreement on how they should be governed.
